Plan for Clean-up

KLAMATH COUNTY can join in a state-wide clean-up program May 6 to 11, a week designated for such purposes by the Oregon Roadside Council.

The council has sent out a list of instructions for clean-up week, and from these we have selected a number which seem particularly pertinent here. They include:

Make a survey of your community and the approaches to your nearest town or city and work to remove whatever is unsightly.

Repair or remove old buildings and eliminate all rubbish, broken board piles and worn-out machinery that is visible from the highway.

Remove or screen dumps and automobile junk yards; remove tin cans and other rubbish from the roadside.

Rake and burn, if possible, all brush and weeds from the fence rows adjacent to the right-of-way.

If needed, plant trees or shrubbery, for such improvements add to the value of your property and to the beauty of the countryside.

Eliminate all snipe advertising signs and advertisements on buildings.

Give your property and your community a general house-cleaning.

Make the countryside clean and attractive—and attempt to keep it so.

A clean-up program here should include not only the city, but the suburban districts and the nearby rural areas. It is an enterprise in which everyone can join wholeheartedly, and it needs the cooperation of the entire public to make it a success.

Hitler's Help

THE story of how Adolf Hitler has unwittingly financed the "Children's Crusade" for children made wretched by war and persecution was revealed this week. The crusade, a nation-wide, non-partisan effort, is taking place in Klamath Falls and schools throughout the nation this week.

Rumania Starts Huge Fort, Road Building Program

BUCHAREST, Rumania, April 25 (UP)—Rumania has started a gigantic fort and road-building program.

All engineers, engineers' assistants, architects and technicians, regardless of age, have been ordered to report to the army May 3, and building materials have been assembled in such vast quantities a crisis looms in the housing industry.

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, April 25—Not all the horses in the republican race have yet appeared in the paddock.

Very soon you will see emerging from the stables the colors of Wendell Willkie, popular utilities manager. A serious movement for him is now being organized, not the casual ones you have noted so far, but a formidable national setup. It may be heralded by the approving bugle of a nationally known labor leader.

Brightest delegate possibilities for the dark horse are his now doubtful former home state of Indiana, and a portion of the New York delegation. He is now a registered republican in New York after earlier democratic voting affiliation in Ohio.

BRITISH STRATEGY

Smart British strategy in Norway is drawing the silent cheers of military men here. If you will open the five fingers of one hand, the tips will denote the points at which Hitler established his Norwegian bases. The British have moved into the spaces between the two top fingers. This puts them in the spots to pinch off the two top bases easily. These two opened spots also afford direct rail and road communications in behind the Norwegian line to which the British have moved up fast to establish an east-west wall of resistance.

Why the Germans left these water railroads open can be explained only by transportation difficulties of their invasion. Apparently Hitler could not handle enough troops originally to occupy any more territory than he did.

Transportation of troops by plane is a slow and unsatisfactory procedure. From the open British bases the allies can rely to a greater extent on sea transport.

Thus the Norwegian conflict has evolved into a race to get men into action. If the British can push fresh forces in as fast as Hitler, they can not only pinch off the two northern bases but stop his advance from the south. If they can move men in faster, they can rout him.

JAP FORECAST

Rear Admiral Tausig will not be sent to the brig for saying the Japanese campaign of conquest, if continued, will make war with the United States inevitable. He said what the navy believes.

Disclaimers were issued by Secretaries Edison and Hull for fear of international repercussions, and particularly because the published condensed versions of Tausig's plain talk were subject to inflammatory misinterpretations. At the same time no one in authority here privately disagrees with what the brilliant commandant of the Norfolk district asserted, although they would have changed his wording a little.

Basic naval belief is that Japanese expansion in the Pacific will inevitably reach and step upon neutral and American toes, unless it collapses before it gets that far. Signs that it may collapse are evident in all the bad economic news from the far east. Therefore, while war is the logical consequence of Japan's policy, it is not imminent or threatening at this particular moment.

DANISH ENVOY

Hitler may have seized Denmark but not the Danish legation here, and particularly not Minister Henry De Kauffmann. Quietly Mr. De Kauffmann has been disregarding orders from his own government in Copenhagen, knowing full well that his superiors are speaking with a gun at their heads. Quietly also he has been setting up a sort of an absentee government of his own here. Committees to handle the shipping problem, Greenland, commercial questions arising as a result of the Nazi

ALL ABOUT BABIES

ANOTHER enemy of childhood is gradually being conquered. Pneumonias of different types have been for a long time leading causes of death among children. The pneumonia may be caused primarily by several types of pneumococcus organisms or it may be secondary to a number of other infectious diseases such as measles, whooping cough or influenza.

It is evident that if we can prevent a number of the infectious diseases likely to be complicated by pneumonia we will be reducing the number of pneumonia deaths. This has actually occurred.

With the primary pneumonias we have had to wait until some more specific means were discovered to control the disease. Until recently we depended upon "expectant treatment," good medical care and routine nursing. Under the best conditions death rates from primary pneumonia in children were not as high as among adults. In the secondary pneumonias the mortality among children was about twice as high as among primary cases.

Research and experimentation have opened the door to a brighter day in the treatment of

the pneumonias. Specific serum treatment was the first key to more successful treatment.

There are many types of pneumonia organisms. Some types yield more readily to the new serum treatment than others. If the pneumonia germs are accurately typed and a serum acting directly against that type is used sufficiently early and in adequate amounts, we may expect the death rate to be reduced. Unfortunately not all types of pneumonia respond equally favorably to this treatment.

Many so-called "pneumonia cures" have been tried and found wanting until the newer remedies came into use. The most recent forward step in treatment came as the result of experimenting with a new drug called sulfapyridine.

Laboratory workers abroad and in the United States in 1938 and 1939 used this chemical on mice infected with pneumonia germs and found many of the mice were saved. Similar treatment was applied to human beings and it worked.

Sulfapyridine is toxic and must be used with caution. It may cause unpleasant symptoms and its action should be carefully watched. For this reason cases of pneumonia should be treated in the hospital so that

any unfavorable symptoms can be checked and steps taken to modify the treatment. The more general use of oxygen in the treatment of pneumonia has undoubtedly helped in controlling the disease.

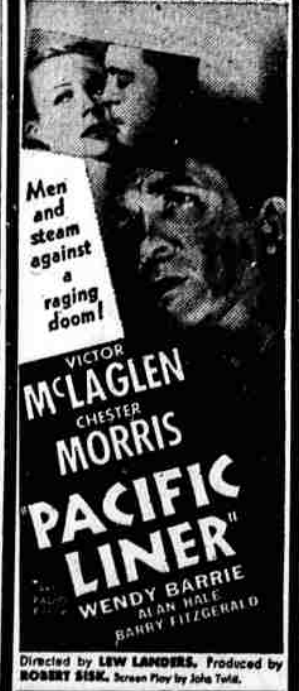
