Word of the death of a former Klamath resident and pioneer of this district was received here Thursday morning when relatives were advised of the passing of Ellsworth Tubbs, 73, of Yreka.

Mr. Tubbs died Wednesday night at his Yreka home. He was a brother-in-law of the late Mrs. Frances Boyd, and the uncle by marriage of Dr. W. R. Boyd and Mrs. Guy Hancock of Klamath Falls and Mrs. Mary Boyd Wagner of New York City. In the early days of Linkville, Mr. Tubbs was well known here. He was a former property owner, later going to Yreka to enter the real estate brokerage business. He was married to Mrs. George Nurse, who died in March, 1928. Later Mr. Tubbs remarried. He visited here frequently and had many friends among the pioneers.

Funeral services will be held in Yreka on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Masonic temple. Interment will take place in Yreka.

SMITH SENTENCED TO 5-YEAR TERM

Robert Stark Smith, 33, parolee from a federal penitentiary, was sentenced Wednesday by Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst to serve five years in the state penitentiary on a charge of forgery.

Smith, who entered a plea of guilty and waived grand jury indictment, had been paroled from a three-year sentence on a previous forgery charge on which he had been given an army court-martial.

WRITE-IN WINS OSC PRESIDENCY

CORVALLIS, April 25 (AP)—Doug Chambers of Salem was elected president yesterday of the associated students of Oregon State college, defeating Leeds Bailey of Blitzen by 25 votes.

Chambers, a write-in candidate, staged a whirlwind campaign at the last minute, flooding the campus with leaflets urging students to write in his name.

Bailey was the only nominee of the nominating assembly and was not expected to meet any opposition. His defeat was attributed to independents and dissatisfied fraternity members.

WELL KNOWN INDIAN FIGHTER SUCCEUMS

Johnny Jackson, young Indian who was one of Klamath's prominent candidates for ring honors on the Pacific coast a few years ago, died Thursday morning at the Hillsdale hospital. He suffered internal injuries in a horse accident on the Jim Johnson ranch at Modoc Point last Tuesday.

Young Johnny Jackson, as he was billed on fight cards during his ring career, fought in numerous local matches and in other cities over the Pacific coast in the years from 1931 to 1935. His speedy attack made him well known among the leading fighters in the lighter classes.

He was 30 years old when he died.

MINOR THEFTS REPORTED HERE

Numerous minor thefts have been reported to city police over the past few days including the loss of equipment from the L. O. Arens parking lot at Seventh and Klamath avenue on Thursday morning.
