EAGLES SLATE PROGRAM FOR MOTHER'S DAY

Mother's day will be observed by Klamath Falls Aerie No. 2090 and ladies auxiliary, Fraternal Order of Eagles with special exercises by all fraternal and civic organizations participating on Sunday, May 12, at 2 p. m. at the Klamath Falls armory.

The principal speaker on the program will be David R. Vandenberg, a prominent member of the FOE. The public is invited to attend.

"This annual commemoration of Mother's day is a long-standing tradition in the Fraternal Order of Eagles," declared Worthy President A. D. (Andy) Meek. Two years before congress set aside the second Sunday in May as Mother's day, the grand aerie or national governing body of the fraternity enacted legislation providing that all aeries in the jurisdiction observe Mother's day with appropriate ceremonies.

The interest of the fraternity in Mother's day dates back to February 7, 1904, the day on which one of its leaders, Frank E. Herring, now editor of the Eagle magazine and chairman of the Eagles national old age pension commission, delivered the first known public plea for a nationwide Mother's day.

In 1925 the American War Mothers issued this statement: "The Fraternal Order of Eagles was the first organization to conduct a national campaign

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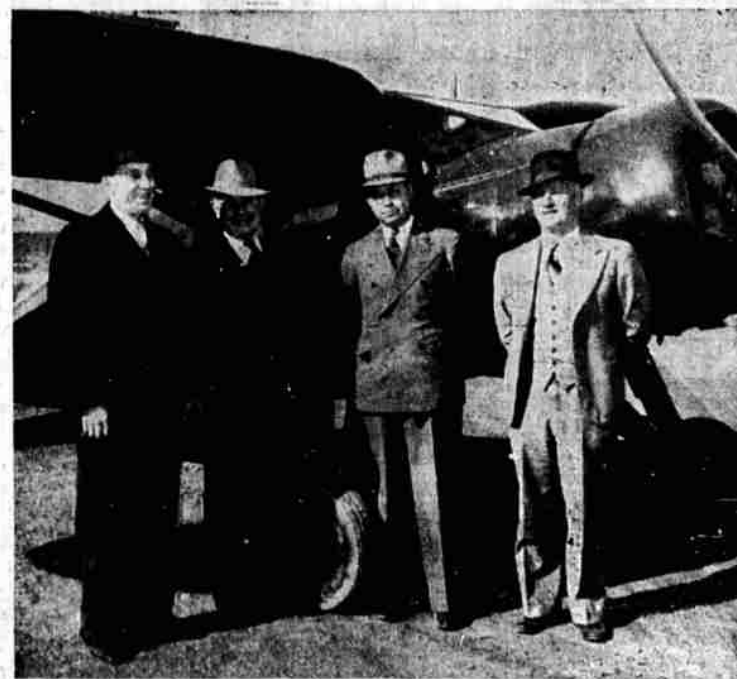
