On Tuesday, April 30, some 180 county musicians will gather in the Altamont Junior high school gymnasium from all corners of the county to stage an all-day band festival.

Included in the day's program will be marches, overtures, solos, ensemble numbers, a massed band made up of all the people participating and a selected 75-piece all-star band.

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Warships Move Into Honolulu After Maneuvers

HONOLULU, T. H., April 27 (UP)—Warships of the United States battle fleet moved into Pearl harbor three abreast in a three-mile parade yesterday after completing extensive secret maneuvers in the Pacific ocean west of the Hawaiian islands.

Admiral James O. Richardson, commander-in-chief of the fleet, said the maneuvers covered a wider range of the Pacific than ever before, and that Johnston Island and French frigate shoals west of the Hawaiian group had been used as maneuver bases.

Admiral Richardson said his flagship, the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, and other battle units steamed farther into the west Pacific than ever before in carrying out the navy's war game problem.

Surveying the month-long maneuvers for the press, Admiral Richardson reported they provided "a very fine exercise" but said there was "nothing particularly new" in the problem in relation to lessons which might have been learned from the current European war.

Youth Confesses Shooting Young High School Girl

ABINGTON, Pa., April 27 (AP)—A 18-year-old Glenside, Pa., boy admitted today, Assistant District Attorney David E. Groshens said, that he shot and killed Edith Snyder, 16, as she sat in her living room Thursday night studying high school lessons.

Groshens said the boy is Robert Heineman, a classmate of the slain girl in Abington high school.

Miss Snyder was shot through the heart by a bullet fired from the front porch of her home.

The assistant district attorney said young Heineman told of the shooting when confronted with a threatening note the girl received some time ago.

It was signed "Bob" and said: "It is imperative that I see you at the end of the fifth period. If I don't see you, someone will die."
