Snow White And Seven Dwarfs Theme Used at Junior Prom Given By Students Saturday Evening

CHILOQUIN—Pettite and demure Patsy Zimmerman, popular senior at Chiloquin high school, suddenly found herself the center of all activity as she became queen of the junior prom on Saturday evening, April the twentieth, at the CHS gym. Militant notes of silver trumpets played by Buddy Gray's band heralded the approach of the royal procession led by little Margaret Lee Grear, flower girl, and little Gerry Barker, crown bearer.

Charmingly attired in a gown of white tulle, a robe of royal blue satin and carrying an arm bouquet of pink carnations, Miss Zimmerman was escorted to the throne and crowned by Aldo Giacomelli, junior class vice president.
