## FAVORITES UP FRACTIONS ON STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, April 27 (AP)—Specialties led the stock market on a selective recovery today that put favorites up fractions to more than a point.

Machinery company issues were out in front throughout. Steels did better, along with a few rails, aircraft and coppers. Dealings were light, however, and small minus signs were fairly well distributed at the close. Transfers were around 400,000 shares for the two hours, one of the lowest turnovers for the past six weeks.

New highs for 1940 were posted for Baldwin Locomotive, National Airmotive and Bridgeport Brass. Supported elsewhere were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem Steel, International Paper, Great Northern, International Mercantile Marine, Johns-Manville, N. Y. Shipbuilding, Anaconda, American Smelting and American Telephone and American Car & Foundry.

Rising difficulties were experienced by Chrysler, U. S. Rubber, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Boeing, U. S. Gypsum, Kennecott and Standard Oil of N. J.

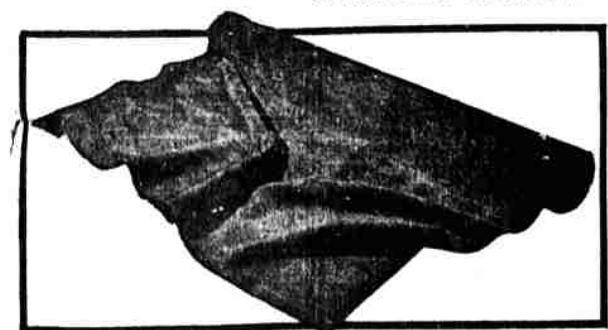

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## WHEAT PIT STAGES STRONG RALLY PUSH

CHICAGO, April 27 (AP)—After a weak start the wheat market staged a strong rally today, scoring net gains of more than a cent a bushel.

The European situation, which caused much uneasiness in the trade, prompted dealers who were short to even up accounts for over the weekend, which helped to give the market a lift. Then, too, hedging pressure against purchases of loan grain was lighter and it was expected this type of selling would diminish after the April 30 deadline for redemption of wheat under loans.

Wheat reacted slightly from the highs but closed 1/4 cent higher than yesterday, May \$1.08 1/2, July \$1.07-1/2; corn 1/2 cent up, May 64 1/2, July 64 1/2; oats 1/2 cent higher.

## WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, April 27 (AP)—USDA—Only a few scattered sales were closed on the Boston wool market during the past week. Fine western grown wools were bought occasionally for future delivery, and bright fleeces of three-eighths and quarter blood grades moved readily when available. Graded greasy combed bright fleece wools were quoted at 33 to 34 cents in the grease, for fine Delaine, at 34 to 35 cents for half bloods and at 36 to 37 cents for three-eighths and quarter bloods.

## ROSEBURG BACKS TURKEY SURPLUS RELIEF PROPOSAL

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 27 (AP)—Outgoing mail of the Roseburg chamber of commerce today contained letters to the governors of the 48 states, congressmen, commodities purchasing heads of the army, navy, marine corps, veterans bureau, civilian conservation corps and other departments offering a simple plan for the immediate relief of the turkey industry.

The letter says that four or five turkey dinners be served the wards, inmates and employees of all public institutions and to the men in service organizations during the spring and summer months.

Pointing out that storage holdings of turkeys now total more than 60 million pounds, the letter states that turkeys can be purchased on the market at a price equal to or lower than most ordinary meats. By using turkeys for four or five Sunday dinners in institutions and for service groups, it is declared, the surplus could be quickly exhausted and turkey growers throughout the nation relieved of a threat of financial disaster during the fall marketing season.
