

CONTESTS END 4-H CLUB FAIR HERE SATURDAY

A wide variety of contests closed the annual Four-H spring fair Saturday when hundreds of club workers closed the books on a year's work in the various handicraft and home economics departments.

The final day of the fair closed with unusually strong competition in all of the contests. In the drop cookie baking contest, judged by Mrs. Sara Wertz, 16 boys and girls vied for honors. First place went to Lucille O'Brien, Alice Trewartha and Dorothy Masters.

Forty-three boys and girls presented exceptionally strong competition in the second annual home economics judging contest. In the clothing division Shirley Christy placed first followed by Edith Pieruccini and Norma Lee Gienger, all three of Chiloquin. In the cooking division first, second and third went to June O'Brien, Anita Smith and Mary O'Brien, respectively.

Baking Contest Held
The first sponge cake baking contest judged by Mrs. Winnifred Gillen, home demonstration agent, assisted by Mrs. Ray Van Meter of Malin took place Saturday morning. First place went to Eida Tyres, second to June O'Brien, and third to Norma Olson.

Competition in the demonstration contests was particularly keen with 32 boys and girls entering the cooking demonstration contests. Mary Lou O'Conner and Elizabeth Donnelly of Merrill took top honors followed by Marvin Bode and Dalton Yokem of Chiloquin. In the miscellaneous demonstration contest judged by Rex High, president of the 4-H leaders' association, and Mrs. E. E. Evans of Chiloquin, the team which took first place was Betty Warren and Ardith Roff of Sprague River who presented a health demonstration on posture and exercises. Clothing demonstration contest was judged by Miss Ruth Chindgren assisted by Mrs. Frank Wilbur and Mrs. Winnifred Darnell of Fairhaven. There were 16 girls competing and first place went to Mary Christy and Norma Lee Gienger for their demonstration followed by Corrine Gillette and Aileen Bacchi who placed second.

Large Review Sponsored
The style review was the largest in the history of 4-H fairs, according to Clifford Jenkins, county club agent. Winner in division II was Nina Sue Fernsten; division III, Jean Masten; division IV, Helen Smith; division V, Betty Fairclough; and knitting division, Betty June Jones. Helen Smith of Malin took the coveted grand champion award with her best dress ensemble. The style review was judged by Winnifred Gillen, Mrs. John Heyden and Mrs. Lloyd Seely assisted by Mrs. Nels Hansen and Mrs. L. C. Wishard.

Judging of exhibits was wound up early Saturday morning. In the room improvement division Wilma Kneess took the blue ribbon, Violet English took the red ribbon and Betty Kneess, the white ribbon. All three girls are from Malin.

In woodworking, judged by Hal Ogile and Sid Abbott, blue ribbon winner was Forrest Seelright, red ribbons went to Willis Glidden and Robert Carnini and white ribbon winner was Leonard Lundgren.

In the poster contest, judged by Katherine Gaylord of Kennell-Ellis Studio and conducted by Mrs. Isabelle Brianni, winners in division I were Arlene Swegle and Jean Burnett with first and second places respectively. In division II, Arlene Swegle, first; Eva Furber, second; Farley Spindler, third; Winifred Spellman, fourth; Evelyn Thurman, fifth; Elaine Pohl, sixth; and Betty Warren, seventh.

Camera contest division I winners were John Ogile, first; Frances Sullivan, second; Zella Sullivan, third. In division II winners were Harold Ogile, first; Nannette Schubert, second.

The healthiest boy and girl in the county 4-H health contest are Dolores Cody and Maurice Christenson of Sprague River. Physical examinations given by Dr. Peter Rozendahl, county health service.

Arnheim Known As Maker of Stars in Musical Circles

Gus Arnheim, famous leader of the nationally known orchestra scheduled to appear at the Klamath Falls armory next Thursday night under auspices of the junior chamber of commerce, has elevated many vocalists and musicians to stardom in Hollywood.

Among his most popular current featured entertainers is Ruth Lloyd, attractive and talented vocalist, who will sing with the band at their Thursday night appearance. Miss Lloyd is among the best liked feminine vocalists in the country today.

Perhaps Arnheim's most famous engagement was at the Coconut Grove, Los Angeles Ambassador hotel. Here Gus and

his orchestra played nightly to the famous stars of movie land for more than three years on one engagement and a year later came back for another lengthy session. He also appeared at the Beverly-Wilshire for an extended engagement where his danceable rhythms won wide acclaim from the select throng who gathered there. It was during his Coconut Grove engagement, however, that Gus Arnheim featured Bing Crosby as his featured vocalist, Crosby having just graduated from the ranks of Paul Whiteman's Rhythm Boys.

Arnheim and his boys are hard to beat in popularity, for his smooth tunes and inimitable style have vast audience appeal.

SUSPECT HELD IN ROBBERY OF CARS

Ace Pearman, charged with grand larceny, was transferred from the city jail to the county jail Saturday following his arrest in a southbound freight car by local officers.

Pearman had in his possession, according to the report of J. D. Brown, SP investigator, one tan leather coat, one green sweater, one blue windbreaker, one lumberjack breaker, and a quantity of golf balls.

According to Brown, Pearman admitted to serving six and one-half years in San Quentin penitentiary for highway robbery in San Francisco. He advised Brown he had "hocked" a lantern and lunchpail at an Oak avenue lunch counter for 75 cents. The articles were the property of Russell Willett of the City Transfer company. The leather jacket was owned by Ray Hough of the Union Oil company. A golf bag and additional balls were located by officers.

Loot was obtained from cars parked on Spring street, Pearman is said to have told Brown. Just five minutes after city police picked up the call to arrest a Mexican named Cortina, the man was in custody and dressed in at the city jail under the name of Damascio Morales Cortina, 22, SP extra gang employee, and charged with larceny from a person. He was transferred to the county jail.

Cortina was alleged to have stolen a watch from Frank Wamek who complained to officers. When the Mexican was searched the watch was found tucked in his hat band, police said.

Charles Christian Watkins, 57, formerly associated with the Peterson-Johnson Lumber company in Lake county, died in Klamath Falls Saturday.

Mr. Watkins came here nine months ago to open a lumber yard on South Sixth street. He leaves a widow and a son and daughter here.
