DEAFNESS MAY BE AIDED BY VITAMIN

WASHINGTON, April 30—Deafness and roaring noises in the ears may be corrected by eating large amounts of vitamin E, the fertility vitamin.

Dr. Samuel M. Josephson of New York City told members of the Acoustical Society of America today that while deafness and fertility had nothing in common, the vitamin was effective for both body deficiencies.

The deafness results from a lack of creatine, one of the substances normally present in the muscles. Insufficient creatine also causes the weakening disease known as myasthenia gravis and other conditions in which the nerves fail to actuate the muscles normally.

"The type of progressive deafness associated with roaring ear noises occurs in persons suffering from vitamin E deficiency," Dr. Josephson said.

He added that "it can be relieved permanently by the administration of vitamin E," which is obtained from wheat germ oil, together with a rich diet furnishing adequate amounts of creatine to the muscles.

"Under the vitamin E treatment the tinnitus, or ear roaring, clears up completely and the deafness improves materially," he told the society.

On April 24, 1898, Spain declared war on the United States. On April 25, 1898, the Spanish-American war began. That war lasted a little more than four years, and took a fearful toll of the flower of American manhood. The number of those who died from disease and those who were rendered hopelessly invalids as a result of their exposure to climatic and living conditions to which they were not accustomed far exceeded the number of those who actually

fell in action.

Nineteen years later, April 22, 1917, was United States day in France. And we who have lived through those eventful years heartily agree with the immortal definition of war as given by General Sherman.

And, today, as we sit on the proverbial powder keg, we look back over these years and wonder if the game is worth the candle.

In October, 1898, a handful of men, the first to be returned from the Philippines, gathered in a small dimly lighted room in Denver and formed the nucleus of what is now a nation-wide organization: The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States. Today our organization boasts some 7500 separate units in every state in the union as well as in our island possessions, with a total membership of approximately one half million. And our membership consists 100 per cent of men who have fought America's foreign wars on land and sea.

And today there is no organization in the United States that is more opposed to participation

In the arguments between other nations than the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States.
