MARKET BACKS AWAY DURING SLOW TRADING

NEW YORK, April 30 (P)—Market leaders displayed slight recovery leanings during the greater part of today's session, but most backed away in the final hour.

Wall Street seemed to work up a little more gloom as the result of the latest reported allied reverses in Norway. Early quiet buying was attributed mainly to domestic business hopefulness inspired by numerous first quarter earnings statements.

Dealings were negligible from the start, but expanded a bit when last-minute selling came into the list. Transfers were around 600,000 shares.

While fractional gains were retained by scattered favorites, losses of fractions to a point or so were well distributed at the close.

Contesting the downward trend were General Motors, Briggs Mfg. U. S. Rubber, Sperry, Consolidated Edison, Standard Oil of N. J., Texas Corp., and Rayonier.

Without much support at the finish were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Montgomery Ward, Santa Fe, Kennecott, Anaconda, International Paper preferred, and Great Northern.

NORTHWEST WHEAT STOCKS DECREASE

PORTLAND, April 30 (AP)—Northwest wheat stocks of 21,206,000 bushels on April 1 were 37 per cent less than a year ago, the government agricultural marketing service revealed today.

Stocks totaled 37,196,000 bushels January 1, indicating a disappearance of 15,990,000 bushels for the first three months.

Oregon warehouses held 3,400,000 bushels at the first of the month or 32 per cent under a year ago.

WHEAT PRICE OFF CENT PER BUSHEL

CHICAGO, April 30 (P)—After fluctuating nervously much of the session, wheat prices fell a cent or more today.

Possibility of moderate deliveries tomorrow on May contracts, which led the decline, caused some selling but the market also was influenced by favorable weather over the grain belt as well as heavy terminal market receipts on the final day for redemption of grain under government loans.

Wheat closed 1-1/2 cents lower than yesterday, May \$1.07 1/2, July \$1.06 1/2; corn 1-1/2 down, May 64 1/2c, July 65 1/2c; oats 1-1/2 lower.

ALL ABOUT BABIES

NORMAL growth and development as mentioned in the previous article depend to a considerable extent upon a well-balanced, nutritious diet. Other factors condition the growth of children, but the proper selection of food is of paramount importance. We now know much more about the right kind of foods in the proper portions than is at present being put into practice. The problem is both economic and health educational.

Children need a balanced diet—food in adequate quantity and of proper quality because it is necessary:

1. To supply building material for the tissues of the body.
2. To make up for the loss of wear and tear of the body.
3. To furnish sufficient energy for the body to perform its functions.
4. To supply certain protective and regulatory substances—the vitamins and mineral salts such as iron, iodine, calcium, phosphorus and minute quantities of other minerals.
5. To assist in the elimination of waste products.

In addition to these requirements the food for a child should be appetizing, attractive, diversified and given at regular periods in a calm, happy, home environment. Bad food habits are often formed in a jangling atmosphere.

There is general agreement that wholesome, clean, safe milk is the one most important element in a child's diet. The chief sources of heat producing foods will be the starchy foods and the fats. Cereals form the most acceptable foods to supply energy and some of the

Milk: One quart a day in some form.
Vegetables: Green leafy, and colored vegetables, cooked or raw potatoes—Irish, sweet and yams, tomatoes.
Fruits: Fresh, cooked or canned. Oranges, grapefruit.
Cereals and Bread: At least one-half of bread and cereals used daily should be whole grain and dark breads.
Eggs: Three or four fresh eggs a week.
Meat, Fish, Cheese: Two to four servings a week.
Fats and Sugars: In addition to foods above but not to take their place, in the form of simple desserts.

essential minerals. Fats containing vitamin A may be given

A wide variety of vegetables may be given according to the age of the child. A liberal amount of green leafy vegetables and the colored vegetables such as carrots, beets, sweet potatoes should be included.

The protein foods will be supplied by milk, eggs, lean meats, fish and cheese. Liver is a valuable food especially if the child is anemic.
