

Team Match Scheduled at Armory

CHICKS MEET CHALLENGE OF BELCASTRO, SERGEANT BOB

The showdown Klamath mat fans have been waiting for is billed tonight at the armory when Cowboy Dude and Bobbie Chick—the airplane spinning combination from Wyoming—meet Pete Belcastro and Sergeant Bob Kenaston in a double-decked grudge fracas in the main event of the weekly wrestling program.

Belcastro and Kenaston have had a fast rise to fame in local grappling circles, standing out as the orneriest duo of matmen on the coast. They stood back to back through two battle royal programs, winning one and getting drubbed in the other, but have issued a challenge to any combination on the coast for a team struggle.

Chicks Victimized

That challenge was accepted by the Chick brothers, both of whom were victims of the unscrupulous combined attacks of the two meenies during the battle royal programs. Cowboy Dude was treated to a punishing double suplex which put him on the shelf for a couple of weeks, and last Tuesday Bobbie had a strong hand in eliminating both Kenaston and Belcastro, only to fall victim of the unruly mariner's Gold Hill crab to lose his subsequent set-to with Kenaston.

The match brings together two pairs of grapplers with exactly opposite tendencies, promising everything in the way of the extraordinary. All four of the grapplers are ex-titlers and rate among the top-notchers of the country.

May Be Short and Sweet

The match will be run off on a four-out-of-six-fall basis or two hours of straight wrestling time, but most local mat experts agree the going will probably be short and to the point. Whenever an event includes Pete Belcastro the fireworks are pretty apt to get underway shortly after the starting gong.

In the semi-windup, Dutch Schultz, big German ruffian, will tangle with the clever Indian boy, Frankie Clemens.

This match will give Clemens the roughest opponent he has yet been signed up against here, but Clemens has long since proved his ability to handle himself in any company.

In the opener popular Ernie Piluso of Portland will meet the sturdy Irish champion, Ray Ryan, in a tussle which should give as much action as either of the higher bouts. Both these boys are wrestlers who like to mix it up fast.

The card gets underway at 8:30 sharp.

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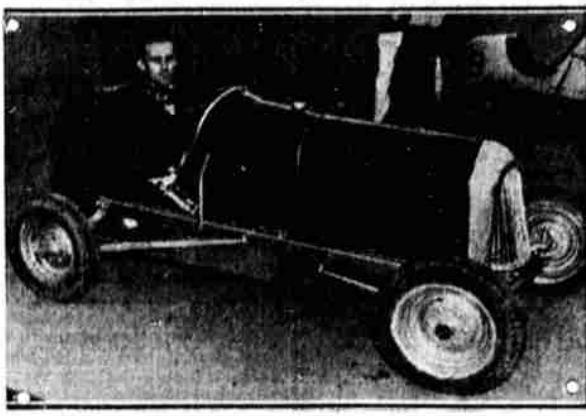

Semi-pro Tourney Set at Medford

MEDFORD, April 30 (Special) The first annual southern Oregon district semi-pro baseball tournament will be held at Medford in early June, and the champion will enter the Oregon semi-pro tournament later in Portland and Silverton.

Dates for the Medford meet are June 10, 12, 13, 14, 17, 19, 20 and 21, it was announced by Ray Brooks, northwest semi-pro baseball commissioner.

The winning team in the double elimination playoff will receive 25 per cent of gross gate receipts to help pay expenses to the state tournament. Eight teams will be entered in the tournament proper, and if more sign there will be pre-tournament elimination to narrow the field to eight.

Recognized semi-pro teams of southern Oregon and northern California will be eligible to compete.

Entries, accompanied by a \$10 fee, must be filed with Commissioner Brooks, 907 S. W. Fifth Ave., Portland, by June 1, and player contracts must be in by June 4. The entry fee helps defray tournament expenses and further the national semi-pro baseball program.

Each team will be permitted to enter 16 players in the tournament.

HARRIS HURLS 2ND WINNING GAME AS SOX VARNISH A'S

NEW YORK, April 30 (UP)—Mickey Harris broke into baseball on Brooklyn sandlots and tried out in the polo grounds but the slender, wiry left-handed pitcher hope of the Boston Red Sox had to leave the big city to make good.

Harris is only 22 years old and wasn't listed on the Red Sox roster for spring training this year but Monday he pitched his second winning game—a seven-hit, 11-3 triumph over the Philadelphia Athletics. He was in trouble only once—in the last inning—and was aided by a 19-hit Boston attack which included five extra base hits, one a homer by Jim Tabor. Ted Williams contributed two triples and drove in three runs.

Bobby Feller bowed to the Detroit Tigers for the second straight time as the Bengals shaded the Cleveland Indians, 4-3.

In the only other American league game scheduled, the New York Yankees snapped out of a three-game losing streak to edge the Washington Senators, 5-4. Spud Chandler came through with an efficient eight-hit pitching job to win his first decision of the year, despite three errors by his teammates and a feeble seven-hit attack. Singles by Frankie Crosetti and Buddy Rosar sent the winning run across in the ninth.

In the National League, the Cincinnati Reds reached Max Butcher, ex-Dodger right-hander, for only five hits but won over the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-2 on Bill Werber's eight-inning homer. Today's win cut Brooklyn's first-place margin to two games over the Reds.

In the only other game scheduled, the St. Louis Cardinals came through with one run in the 10th inning to trim the Chicago Cubs, 6-5.

President Roosevelt telephoned his mother's home when she reached there and talked with her for 15 minutes, during which she assured him she was all right.

SEAL HITTER PACES LOOP; PADRE MOUND ACE ON TOP

Ted Jennings, San Francisco infielder whose batting talent seems sensational in comparison with the mediocrity of his teammates, led Pacific Coast league hitters Monday with an average of .461, according to figures compiled by William McGee, league statistician.

Jennings has hit safely 47 times in 102 trips to the plate and scored 24 runs. Mike Christoff, with 48 hits and 19 runs in 107 tries, was second with .449. Behind him, in order, were Louis Novikoff, Los Angeles, .422, Steve Mesner, San Diego, .413, and Bill Schuster, Seattle, .380.

Dick Newsome, San Diego mound ace, moved into first place among the league's pitchers with a perfect record of five winning performances in five starts. Wayne Osborne, of Hollywood, who led the field last week, slid down to sixth place with six wins and one defeat. Behind Newsome with perfect records were Orrell of Portland, Nick Radunich and Tom Simmons of Seattle, and Jim Morris of San Diego. They each had a win and no losses credited to them.

Although Oakland finished on the tail end of its series with San Diego, the Oaks clung to a half-game lead in the league standings with the Padres in close pursuit. Los Angeles was three games behind in third place, while Seattle, which lost a 4-2 series decision at the hands of the slumping Seals, was in fourth place.

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In This Corner

RIDGEWOOD, N. J., April 30 (UP)—Over here in the Ridgewood country club is a man who is devoting much of his life to making golf a better game for the average player.

The name is familiar to all who've ever hooked a tee shot into the woods or crashed a niblick into a sand-trap—George Jacobus, former president of the Professional Golfers' association and now honorary president.

For the last five years Jacobus, who has been pro at Ridgewood for upwards to 25 years, has made an exhaustive study of golf and how to make it more enjoyable for the sun-driest player. And today he came up with facts and figures to show where the present system of handicapping is all wrong.

"I think that any changes made in the rules of golf should be done with the object of giving the average player more pleasure and enjoyment of his game," Jacobus said.

Jacobus suggests that "some golf organization take the initiative in devising a new handicapping system, providing the amateur golfers with handicaps based separately on medal play and match play."

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GODOY AGREES FOR RETURN GO WITH LOUIS

NEW YORK, April 30 (UP)—Joe Louis will defend his heavyweight title on June 20 against Arturo Godoy, the rugged Chilean who almost won the championship on Feb. 9.

The fight, Louis' 11th defense of the title he won from Jimmy Braddock in 1937, was announced by Promoter Mike Jacobs who said he believed it should lure at least \$600,000 into the Yankee Stadium cash registers.

Godoy, who earned a split decision against Louis, must place \$25,000 of his share of the purse in escrow if he wins the title as guarantee that he will give Louis a return match within 60 days.

In event Louis wins, he probably will face the winner of the Max Baer-Tony Galento fight in a September defense.

The battle will be 15 rounds and ticket prices will range from \$2 to \$27.50. Godoy will collect 17½ per cent of the net and Louis 40 per cent.

In the last fight—the closest Louis has had since he won the title—Godoy was voted the decision by one of the three ring officials. He fought from a crouch and gave Louis many uneasy moments.
