RHODES NAMED POLICE CHIEF AT TULELAKE

TULELAKE—Frank G. Rhodes, Yreka, will succeed Frank Graham, Tulelake, as chief of police, his appointment to become effective May 1, it was announced following a council session Monday night. Rhodes, with a long record of public service in law enforcement, was for three years and a half with the sheriff's office of Alameda county; was special investigator for 18 months with the U.S. department of labor and was on the Yreka city police force for more than two years. Graham is resigning because of other interests.

Rhodes will bring his family here to reside following the close of school.

Mayor Ben Booth announced that resolutions authorizing an election for organization of a joint rural fire district in Siskiyou county and the Tulelake district in Modoc county are being drawn up by boards of supervisors of both counties on May 6, the election to follow at a later date.

The original district, organized more than a year ago, was dissolved recently when legal difficulties developed relating to the area to be served by the rural equipment. The equipment to be housed in Tulelake, will be interchangeable with city fire fighting equipment and will be manned by the city volunteer force.

Telegraphic communication from Engineer Hussey to Harold Roath, city clerk, stated that plans and specifications on the city water and sewage projects, expected this week, will probably not arrive for another week.

T. E. Davis of Gold Hill, formerly of Klamath Falls, passed away suddenly Monday, April 22, while working on the Beaver Portland Cement company dam in Gold Hill. The funeral was held last Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the IOOF hall in Gold Hill. Mormon IDS services were held and burial was at the Rock Point cemetery.

Death came suddenly due to hardening of the arteries. He had gone to work on the cement plant dam that morning apparently in good health. He slumped over while working at about 10:30 a. m. and was found to be dead a few minutes later.

Mr. Davis moved from Klamath Falls to Gold Hill two years ago with his family. When living in Klamath Falls he was in charge of the Klamath Auto Wreckers on South Sixth street, and made a great many friends while here.

Mr. Davis was born in Wales, Utah, August 30, 1892. In August, 1914, he was married in Montana and then moved to Canada with his family where he lived for 22 years. The family moved to Klamath Falls where they lived for two years before moving to Gold Hill.
