SENIORS NAMED TO HEAD CLASS AT GRADUATION

CHILOQUIN — Robert Muskrat, prominent senior at Chilochin high school, is valedictorian for the class of 1940. He has earned 19 credits and made a scholastic average of 95.6. Robert has been a student of CHS during the entire four year period and has made an "all one" average in each subject during this time.

Announcement was made last week that he has been awarded a scholarship for the year 1940-1941 to Oregon State college where he plans to enroll in the school of engineering.

Proof that Robert is an all around good student is evident by his participation in a variety of extra curricular activities. Beginning in his freshman year, he was editor of the CHS paper. While a sophomore he was class president, parliamentarian for the CHS student body, took active parts in school plays and operettas, was a member of the debate and declamation teams and participated in athletics.

Due to a conflict in schedule he was unable to participate in debate and declamation work during the present school year, but he made outstanding records in each field during his three years of work.

Varied athletic interests resulted in his taking active parts in football, basketball and track. He played halfback on the football team and is a two-letter man. He is a three-year letterman in track, has been track captain during 1939 and 1940 and is captain of the relay team. He is a 100-year and 220 man is heavily favored as being the fastest B class sprinter in the country.

During the present year he has also served as president of CHS student body and is editor of "Panther Tracks," Chilochin high school annual.
