Junior Tracksters Take 2nd Place

Klamath Union high school's junior track squad, handled by Coach Forrest Kirby, tied the Grants Pass juniors for second place Saturday at Medford in the first annual Southern Oregon B track meet. Medford placed first with 52 points. The Klamath and Grants Pass point totals were 23.

Klamath's performance was highlighted by Johnson's time of 3:49 to win the three-quarter mile. Johnny Sweek placed second in both the 330 and 860. Baker took second in the 75-yard dash, Foster second in the 150-yard dash, and Johnson second in the high jump. Medford won the high jump with a mark of 5 feet, 8 1/2 inches.

Richard Vallencour of Klamath placed second in the broad-jump with a leap of 18 feet 7 inches. Klamath took third in the relay.

Teams were also entered from Medford Junior high and Jacksonville.

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
