

ASSISTANCE CASES GIVEN REVIEW HERE

Review of old age assistance cases is now receiving the attention of the county welfare department staff, and several review cases will be brought before the welfare board meeting at the courthouse Tuesday.

Under the law, the department is required to make a periodical review of all cases, at least once a year. The entire old age case load is re-examined to determine if the need is properly being taken care of, or if resources have developed that would make the applicant self-supporting if properly used.

Altha Urquhart, welfare administrator, stated that there still is some public misunderstanding of old age assistance, particularly by persons who have the impression the state gives an old age pension.

Assistance, she said, is based strictly on need. Under the present law it can be given only when it is found the applicant could not survive without it.

Mrs. Urquhart said the old age assistance records are audited by state and federal auditors. Each case, she said, must be determined by the record in black and white, and sentimental factors receive no consideration by the auditors.

LEAGUE TO BOOST BETTER DRIVING

With its purpose being to give the nation better auto drivers, the Ford Good Drivers' league is being organized in Klamath county as well as other communities throughout the county, according to Elmer Balsager of the Balsager Motor company.

Approximately \$30,000 is being offered in prizes in the nationwide contest. Boys between 14 and 19 years of age are eligible, but each entry must be qualified and legally authorized to drive a car in his home state.

Each of the 48 state winners or other sponsor of his own choosing, will be given a trip to the New York World's fair. Forty-eight university scholarships will be given to national winners.
