

Weed Sons Shut Out 'Jacks, 5-0

NEW HURLER HOLDS DORRIS, KLAMATH NINE TO FIVE HITS

Weed's Sons of Italy took the opener in the Northern California league Sunday afternoon by shutting out the Dorris-Klamath Lumberjacks 5-0 before a huge crowd of fans. The game was played at Weed.

The scorecard was all zeros as the afternoon waned except for the second and third innings when the classy Weed Sons pushed over five runs to sew up the contest.

Jack Gerstenberg of Daly City, California, was the surprise pitcher that Manager Frank Groppi sent to the mound to face the invading batsmen.

Gerstenberg, who hurled for Boise in the Pioneer league last season, set the highly touted Lumberjacks down with five hits and a big blank in the run column. Weed's new pitcher showed fine control, a baffling sidearm curve, and an effective change of pace. He retired nine via strikeouts, walking none.

Clyde Carlstrom went the full route for the Lumberjacks, allowing but six hits.

The Klamath pitcher blanked the Sons after the third frame and was credited with six strikeouts. Carlstrom issued but one free pass to first. Only three of Weed's runs were charged to the Dorris-Klamath pitcher, the remaining two being scored on an infield error.

In the second inning for Weed with two out Carlstrom walked E. Barbieri, Rocchi singled, and Dawson slammed a homer over the left field wall to score three runs. During Weed's half of the third, F. Acquaspace singled, followed by Mazzoni's double. Both runners scored when Frazzetta knocked a dribbler down third base line and the resulting throw was wide at home plate.

Goldbar was the only Lumberjack to reach third, when he tripled in the second inning. With no outs, his teammates were unable to score him. Goldbar's triple and single led other Lumberjack hitters with L. McIntyre collecting a double.

Next Sunday Dunsmuir's Railroaders invade Manager "Red" Tolbert's new park at Dorris in the second game of the league circuit.

SEATTLE, May 6 (AP)—Washington and Washington State, those ancient rivals, will be kicking cinders in each other's eyes at Pullman this Saturday in a track and field event which may decide the northern division dual meet championship.

The two schools from the Evergreen state continued undefeated last Saturday, Washington knocking off Oregon State here, 79 to 51 while Washington State downed Oregon at Pullman, 73 to 58.

Washington State has dominated northwest track for years, winning division meets with monotonous regularity and being almost as poisonous to the opposition in the dual duels.

But next Saturday the Cougars will have to hustle or the rejuvenated Washington Huskies may take 'em.

Washington's Coach Hec Edmundson discounts the fact his team beat Oregon by a higher score than did the Cougars—it was 77-54 for Washington—but he indicated he feels the Huskies have a good chance to halt the Cougar winning streak this week.

Most of last Saturday's headline performances came from Pullman. There, Boyd Brown, the thumbersome Oregon javelinist, tossed the spear 220 feet, one-eighth inch, and Lee Orr equalled the division 220-yard low hurdles record with a 23.2 performance.

The Cougars took eight first places to seven for Oregon. In Seattle, Washington grabbed an early lead and kept it throughout. The Huskies captured 10 firsts to five for OSC, and scored clean sweeps in the 100, 220 and broad jump. The Huskies took a licking in the distance events, however.

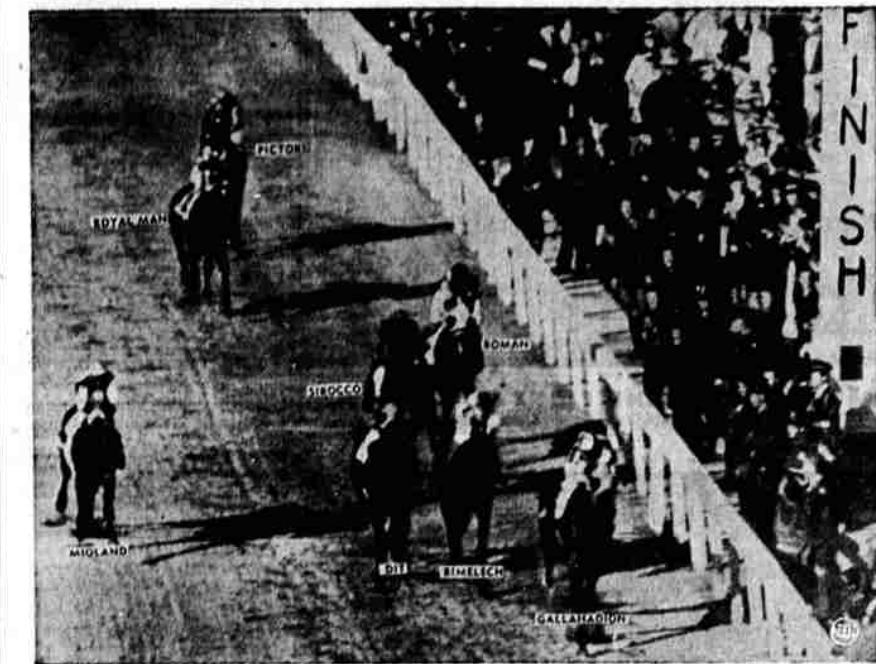

It will require more than one licking, in other words, to convince most of the horse players that Bimelech is not the best of an unimpressive lot of three-year-olds. Not that the underdog Gallahadion didn't take Bim's measure fairly and squarely in the derby and run right past him in the stretch.

Bimelech is not, of course, the super-horse he had been made out. Gallahadion's winning time of 2:05—more than three seconds off the Churchill Downs track record for the mile and one-quarter—made it all too obvious that there were no equine immortals in Saturday's gathering.

Carroll Bierman, the one-time Centralia, Wash., boy, gave Gallahadion a beautiful ride. All the way around he kept him up close to the leaders, rating his mount carefully and saving him for the big effort. When Bimelech sverfled out and left the rail clear, Bierman shot into the opening so quickly as to surprise the great crowd. It was obvious in that instant that Gallahadion had the race won. Bimelech, tiring badly in the last sixteenth, likely would have lost the place to Dit if they had gone another ten yards.

Probably the second biggest disappointment of the race was Miland. The coast horse had been heavily backed both in the winter books and in the mutuels, but he never gave his supporters a hope and was forced to make up ground in finishing fourth.

Saturday night around the Louisville hotel lobbies it was next to impossible to locate any of the lucky few who had cashed in on Gallahadion. He was about the one horse that hadn't been banded around as a "hot tip," as was obvious by his near-record payoff of \$72.40 on each \$2 mutuel ticket.

YANK RUNNERS LEFT ON BASE IN 6-4 LOSS

Break up the Yankees! There was a time when that chant was as familiar as "take me out to the ball game" and the folks wondered how many players the world champions would give up without being weakened.

But—they were beaten again Sunday by the Detroit Tigers 6-4 in the kind of a game they seldom if ever would have lost last year.

Three times New York loaded the bases and only on one of these occasions did they score—an ineffectual run in the ninth. Thirteen runners were left on the bases. In the last nine games, of which the Yanks have lost six—they have left 69 men on the bases.

Imagine that from the slugging Yanks—the Bronx bombers—who used to break up game with their big innings!

Meantime Bob Feller came up with one of his better pitching shows yesterday to beat the Red Sox 6-2. He allowed seven hits, struck out eight and yielded only one base on balls. Ken Keltner gave noble aid, including a three-run homer, a single and a double.

This boosted the Tribe back into the league lead.

The Chicago White Sox, a first division club last year and a tailender so far, just managed to edge out the Philadelphia Athletics 6-5 and the St. Louis Browns came from behind to top the Washington Senators 7-3.

The Brooklyn Dodgers took up where they left off before the rains came by trimming the St. Louis Cardinals 9-6 in a wild game in which 39 players, a record breaking total, took part. The Dodgers used 22 players and succeeded in producing two four-run rallies that carried the day.

Two errors helped the Cincinnati Reds to a 3-2 decision over New York.

The Phillies put down a four-run ninth inning uprising by the Chicago Cubs to win 7-5 and the Boston Bees finally scored another triumph—their third by a 5-1 margin over the Pittsburgh Pirates.
