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STATE GRANGE RETAINS GILL; LEWIS IN RACE

PORTLAND, May 7 (P)—The Oregon grange elected A. W. Gill of Portland yesterday as state master for the fifth consecutive time.

Gill polled 5252 votes to 3074 for W. J. Wilcox of Mosier. Morton Tompkins of Dayton defeated Harry Schmeitzer of Sherwood for overseer; Bertha Beck, Portland, won from Mrs. Anna Hadley of Silverton, in the secretary race.

Mrs. G. W. Thiessen, Milwaukee, was reelected lecturer, and Peter Zimmerman, Yamhill, and Fref Goff, Roseburg, were named executive committeemen. A third committeeman will be elected during the state convention June 10-14 at Salem, because none of four candidates received the required majority.

The third committeeman election will be between W. A. Johnson, Grants Pass, and L. Alva Lewis, Klamath Falls. Johnson received 3702 votes, Lewis 3511, Minne McFarland of Boardman 3095, and Henry Gustafson, North Bend, 2979.

KLAMATH SELECTED BY JUNIOR CHAMBER

Klamath Falls was selected as the site for the next state convention of the junior chamber of commerce, which will be held sometime in May of 1941, when delegates from various cities of the state met in Eugene last weekend for the 1940 session.

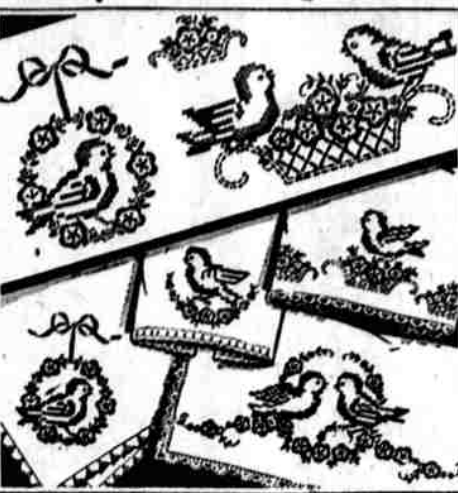

ROSEBURG, Ore., May 7 (P)—Plans of a group of transients for a grand feast in the local hobo "jungle" were rudely interrupted by a group of state, county and city police, who discovered and appropriated the cache of foodstuffs procured for the occasion. Deputy Sheriff Cliff Thornton, reported the officers discovered the cache of goods, stolen from a Roseburg Safeway store Friday morning, when Matt Pearl and Walter Coomes, who were ordered held to the grand jury, were unable to wait until after the feast to sample some of the wine included in the loot from the food store, Thornton said.

Officers spent the greater part of Friday searching "jungles" and outgoing trains, seeking the goods stolen from the store. Coomes, who, Thornton said, was released only two weeks ago from the state penitentiary after serving a sentence for grand larceny in Polk county.

Said election to be held upon two (2) propositions levying taxes submitted by voters by the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, pursuant to Ordinance No. 3143 duly adopted by the Common Council of said city on the 8th day of April, 1940, and proved by the Mayor on the 10th day of April, 1940.

Said Ordinance No. 3143 is entitled as follows: **ORDINANCE NO. 3143**
An Ordinance calling a special election in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, on Friday the seventeenth (17) day of May, 1940, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said city two (2) certain Charter Amendments proposed by the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; authorizing the Common Council to levy taxation over and above the amount levied for

the preceding year plus six per cent; which Charter Amendments are submitted to the people under and by virtue of Ordinance No. 2082 duly enacted and passed by the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, on the 19th day of May, 1930, and entitled as follows: "An Ordinance to provide for carrying into effect in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, the Initiative and Referendum Powers reserved to Legal Voters of Municipalities by Section I-A of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon; and to enact and amend their Municipal Charter reserved to the Legal Voters of Cities and Towns by Section II, Article XI of the Constitution of said State"; authorizing and directing the Police Judge to publish notices of said election, designating the polling places and the judges and clerks of said election; appropriating money for said election; repealing all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith, and declaring an emergency.

A Resolution Providing for the Levying of a Tax of One Mill upon the Dollar upon All Taxable Property in Klamath Falls, Oregon, for the Year 1940 for the Purpose of Producing a Sum of Money to be used for the Purchase, Operation and Maintenance of a Pickup Street Sweeper for the Cleaning and Maintaining of City Streets of Said City; Creating a Special Fund to be known as the "Street Sweeper Fund"; Calling an Election to be held for the Purpose of Voting upon the Matter; Providing a Ballot Title for the Question to be Submitted; and Directing the Posting and Publication of Election Notices.

The ballot title adopted for said tax levying proposition is as follows:

"Charter Amendment And Tax Levying Proposition Submitted To The Voters By The Common Council"
"Shall the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, be authorized to levy a rate of taxation of one mill upon each dollar of all taxable property in Klamath Falls, Oregon for the year 1940 for the purpose of creating funds for the purchase, operation and maintenance of a pickup street sweeper for maintaining and cleaning city streets and to replace obsolete, worn out sweeper; creating a special "Street Sweeper Fund"; amending all tax limitations contained in the city Charter insofar as such levy is concerned."
