BULLDOG WILL MEET INDIAN: FEELING HIGH FOR TOP BOUT

Feeling runs high in at least four hairy chests today as Pete Belcastro and Sergeant Bob Kenaston get ready to stand off what's bound to be a wild assault from the rampagin' Chick brothers, Cowboy Dude and Bobbie, in the main event team bout tonight at the armory.

So much is likely to happen that two referees instead of one will be on duty to handle the four gladiators when they come together to settle a difference which welled up last week in one of the maddest brawls yet witnessed at the Klamath arena.

Chicks See Red
Vowing vengeance for what they term a dirty deal, the Chick brothers are plainly after the kill tonight and should make things plenty interesting for the unschupulous terror twins, Belcastro and Kenaston. But before the main event classic gets underway fans will have a chance to view one of the most celebrated grapplers of the day—Bulldog Jackson himself, who returns to Klamath after a lengthy absence. Jackson, ultra-meanie that he is, will tangle with Frankie Clemens, popular Indian wrestler, in the feature attraction of the evening.

To open the card, the promoter has billed Ernie Piluso, popular Portlander, against the big German, Dutch Schultz, who has yet to meet his equal for sheer brutality.

Piluso a Hard-Hitter
This bout should start the fireworks, as Piluso seldom stands for roughing without swinging into some pretty wild action himself. One of his favorite maneuvers is the flying tackle and he's noted as a hard-hitting, hard-to-hurt grappler. Schultz is bound to start his hair-pulling, choking maneuvers and Piluso isn't the type to sit around and let him do it un-molested.

The Jackson-Clemens affair will bring together two clever grapplers. Although Bulldog is noted for his unorthodox methods, he knows more about the game than most men in the business. In his day he has met most of the big-boys and has picked up a wrestling experience that is hard to match.

The Wonder Boy depends on science to a great extent but has been known to show his teeth. His Indian paralyzer is one of the most unique holds in the business.

Fans Still Talking
Much talk has been heard around the wrestling hangouts that last week's main event team struggle was the most colorful and hair-raising bout billed here for years. Fans were standing in their seats a good

It was largely at the insistence of the blood-seeking Chick brothers that two referees were obtained for tonight's struggle. Advance ticket sales indicate a sellout crowd.

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YANKS DROP 3RD STRAIGHT CONTEST TO TIGERS 6-4

NEW YORK, May 7 (UP)—Hank Greenberg, a Bronx boy who had to travel to Detroit to gain a major league berth, came home Monday and did everything but slap a mortgage on the Yankee stadium.

Greenberg, apparently one of those rare ballplayers who make good in more than one position, staged his own "welcome home" celebration as the Tigers pounded out an uphill, 6-4 victory over the New York Yankees. The loss was the third straight for the Yankees and tumbled them into sixth place in the American league, one full game away from the cellar.

Genial, long-limbed Hank, switched from first base to left field this season to give heavy-hitting but awkward Rudy York a chance as a Detroit regular, slammed out a homer and two doubles to drive in three runs.

The Boston Red Sox vaulted over the Cleveland Indians into first place by defeating the Tribe, 8-5. Jimmy Foxx touched off a six-run outburst in the fourth by smashing his sixth homer of the season off Willis Hall. Three singles, a double and two walks followed to hand Hall his first defeat of the season. Ben Chapman, Indian rightfielder, homered with the bases empty in the fourth.

Philadelphia's Athletics hopped into fifth place with a 3-2 decision over the last place Chicago White Sox.

The St. Louis Browns laid down a 16-hit barrage off four Washington pitchers but needed a run each in the eighth and ninth innings to nip the Senators, 11-9.

Cincinnati's National league champion Reds staged a belated May day parade by walking away with the New York Giants, 9-1 for their fourth straight success.

Chicago's Cubs won their third victory, 4-1, as they defeated the Dodgers won their 12th start, 6-2 over the St. Louis Cardinals to hold first place at the head of the pack.

The Cards to nine hits in the second win. Herman's 11th inning home run with none on, gave the Cubs a 5-4 win over the Philadelphia Phillies and a 10-7 victory in the 12th inning over the Boston Bees to lead the Pittsburgh Pirates, 10-7. It was the Pirates' eighth straight loss.

Texas Cowboy Rated High For Battle With Champion

NEW YORK, May 7 (UP)—A

Texas cowboy whose life-work is punching men instead of steers goes after the lightweight title next Friday and the chances are good that he'll give the Lone Star state its first major boxing champion in recent years.

Mark the name well, for around 11 Friday night they might be holding the right arm of Lew Jenkins above the ring of Madison Square Garden and pronouncing him "the winner and new champion."

Jenkins of Sweetwater, Tex., riding the crest of a 10-fight winning streak that saw him kazo his last seven opponents, goes against Lou Ambers of Herkimer, N. Y., a rough, tough

little guy who can't hurt very much with one punch but who works his fists so often that the result usually spells victory—for him.

The smart men today were betting 8 to 5 that Ambers retains the title he hasn't defended since he won it back from Henry Armstrong last August.

Because more than six months have elapsed since he defended the title, and because he refused to meet a challenger named by the National Boxing association, Ambers was threatened by that body. He still is champion in New York and affiliated states, however, and as far as most of the world is concerned he's their 135-pound ruler, too.

SEAL BATTER LEADS LOOP WITH .461

For the third consecutive week, Ted Jennings, San Francisco infielder, led the Pacific Coast league hitters with a percentage of .461, but he was being pressed hard by Mike Christoff of Oakland, who clung to the second-place spot.

Jennings has been a big factor in keeping the otherwise feeble Seals operating under their own power. The O'Doumen managed to crawl out of the cellar, at the expense of Portland, last week. Jennings, according to figures compiled by William McGee, league statistician, has hit safely 56 times and scored 28 runs in 125 times at bat. Christoff got 57 hits and 24 runs in 131 trips to the plate for an average of .438.

Behind Christoff were John Moore, Los Angeles, .419; Louis Novikoff, Los Angeles, .396, and Steve Mesner, San Diego, .369.

Nick Radulich and Tom Simmons of Seattle, Jim Morris of San Diego and Julio Bonetti of Los Angeles were the only pitchers in the league who still had perfect records, each with one win and no defeats. Last week's leader, Dick Newsome of San Diego, fell behind into fifth place behind the four-way tie by losing a game against Sacramento.

Newsome now has five wins and one defeat to his credit and Norbert Kleinke of Sacramento was in second place with four victories and one loss.

San Diego grabbed a slender, half-game leadership in the league standings on the strength of its double win over Sacramento Sunday which counted heavily enough to move the Padres ahead of Oakland. Los Angeles was three games behind in third place and Hollywood trailed in fourth place by three and one-half games.
