

TRADERS TURN TO BUYING IN IDLE SESSION

NEW YORK, May 7 (AP) — Traders, idling during most of today's stock market, turned to the buying side in the final hour and pushed up a handful of issues 1 to 3 points.

While definite market clues from the war were lacking, a little stimulation was derived from earnings statements, optimistic business items and the feeling the market had been acting well in the face of the cloudy foreign picture.

The address of Prime Minister Chamberlain to the house of commons, explaining the British retreat in Norway, proved a "dud" so far as any real reaction on prices was concerned and in brokerage offices was termed an "anti-climax" to the already published allied reverses in Scandinavia.

Although threats of an upheaval in the Mediterranean were still viewed as an important question mark, the majority of boardroom customers were more bullish than otherwise. Volume was inconsequential the greater part of the day, but better than yesterday. The turnover approximated 600,000 shares.

U. S. Steel and Bethlehem edged forward, and independent strength was displayed by Montgomery Ward, United Aircraft, Atlantic Refining, Dow Chemical, Westinghouse, U. S. Rubber preferred, Eastern Star Lines and American Airlines.

WHEAT UNCERTAIN. LOWER AT CLOSE

CHICAGO, May 7 (AP) — Wheat prices moved uncertainly today and after recovering small early losses sagged again in late trade to register declines of as much as a cent a bushel under the previous close.

July and September contracts, new crop deliveries, led the downward movement, with the former dropping to \$1.03 1/2, off 1 1/2c from the day's high, before encountering support.

Wheat closed 1/2-3/4c lower than yesterday's close, May \$1.05 1/2, July \$1.03 1/2-3/4; corn unchanged to 1/4c higher, May 65c, July 65 1/2c; oats unchanged. Earlier wheat was up as much as 1/4c.
