BRUSH LAND FIRES TOPIC OF MEETING

Owners of some of the larger tracts of brush and grassland outside the timbered districts of the Klamath basin have been called by the county court to a meeting next Tuesday for a discussion of fire prevention.

The court said that efforts will be made to have the land owners assume responsibility for fire prevention on the land, which is no longer classified as forest land. At the present time there is no legal setup to carry on fire prevention work although many serious fires originate in the brush and grassland under question.

The county court has appointed a county fire warden and has made a small appropriation for fire prevention but due to increased fire hazards from year to year further steps are needed.

MILLER'S DEATH HELD ACCIDENT

LONDON, May 10 (AP)—A coroner's inquest decided Thursday that Webb Miller, European general manager of the United Press, died accidentally as a result of a fall from a train at Chapham Junction.

Dr. Frederick Simpson testified Miller suffered a fractured skull and "his injuries were consistent with a simple fall onto the railroad track."

"It is a sad case, a sad end to a brilliant life."

Funeral services will be held tomorrow in the chapel of Golders Green crematorium. Miller's ashes will be sent to the United States. His widow and 18-year-old son are in New York.
