Anniversary Of Pioneers

Former Klamath Residents Honored At Ashland Home

The following story which appeared recently in the Ashland Daily Tidings will be of interest to the many friends of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Loosley, formerly of this city:

"Mr. and Mrs. George W. Loosley yesterday observed their sixtieth wedding anniversary at their Third street home here. Although Mrs. Loosley has been quite ill for several days, friends sent many gifts, letters and telegrams.

"Emma T. Anderson and George W. Loosley were married May the second, 1880, at the residence of Captain O. C. Applegate, brother-in-law of the bride, at the Klamath Agency. Mr. Loosley was in government employ at the time of his marriage, as superintendent of shops and mills. They lived there for two years after their marriage and then moved to their ranch near Fort Klamath which they have owned ever since.

"Mr. Loosley purchased the steamer 'General Howard' and ran freight from Linkville, now Klamath Falls, to Fort Klamath, with his brother, John F. Loosley. They then built a new boat, with a stern wheel, replacing the other, a screw propeller. "Following the selling of his freight business, Mr. Loosley built the Linkville hotel which he sold in 1901 when he was appointed custodian of the abandoned Fort Klamath after the soldiers were moved out. He served in this capacity for two years before returning to his ranch where he started raising cattle and improving his 1000 acres of land.

In 1908 he went into partnership with Robert Neil and Sons Meat company and they operated three retail shops in Ashland. He then sold out to his partners and again Mr. and Mrs. Loosley returned to their ranch where they have made their home except for a few months when they traveled until they purchased their Third street home in this city about a year ago.

"Mr. and Mrs. Loosley were both born and raised in Oregon. Mr. Loosley went to Fort Klamath in 1872 with his parents, and Mrs. Loosley spent her girlhood in the Ashland vicinity.

"There were 15 wedding guests at their ceremony, out of which only two are living. "Mr. and Mrs. Loosley are the parents of four children, two of which are deceased. Their two sons C. B. Loosley, is a rancher and cattleman at Fort Klamath and E. K. Loosley, is a builder and contractor in Klamath Falls. They have five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

"Mr. Loosley is a member of the local chapter of the D. A. R. Mr. Loosley is the oldest living member of the Ashland Masonic lodge, having joined in June, 1870. They are both members of the Eastern Star and are active members of Trinity Episcopal church."

HOW to EAT to BEAT the HEAT

MAN starts off life on a milk diet and quite often he ends up the same way. Milk never lets the human race down. And there's a reason. It is the most nearly perfect food. It furnishes the body more of the building and regulating substances than any other food—and more cheaply at that.

The statement that children need the equivalent of one quart of milk daily is the result of long and careful scientific experiments. Milk protein, the builder of muscle and other soft tissue, is of the highest quality found in any food. One pint (two cups) of milk compares favorably in protein content with any one of the following:

Two large eggs, 25 (3 1/2-inch) strips of bacon, one small serving of meat or fish, five medium-sized potatoes, five slices of bread, one-half cup of peanuts.

Probably the biggest gift of milk is its calcium (lime). The body needs lime to build bones and teeth. Serving for serving, no other food can substitute for milk in supplying calcium. Milk also contains appreciable amounts of the mineral, phosphorus, another bone and tooth builder.

One pint of milk (two cups) contains the same amount of calcium as any of the following foods:

Eighty apples, 65 medium bananas, 24 medium oranges, 35 medium potatoes, 10-12 servings of 3 1/3-ounce carrots, 12 servings of same weight cabbage, 17 to 18 eggs, 38 slices whole wheat bread, 40 slices of white bread (made with milk), 140 cups of cornflakes or 22 cups cooked oatmeal.

Studying this list it is easy to understand why children can't possibly eat sufficient food to get all their calcium from non-milk foods. Many other foods contain calcium, but for the most part only in small quantities.

But protein and calcium is not all of the story of milk. It contains other vitally necessary minerals and an abundant supply of vitamin A and riboflavin, along with a generous amount of vitamin B1 (thiamin) and nicotinic acid and a variable amount of vitamin C. Some milks have been fortified with vitamin D and are so labeled.
