

Jacks Turn Back Dunsmuir, 9-6

LOCALS SEND 3 HURLERS TO SHOWERS WITH 16 HITS

The Dorris-Klamath Lumberjacks pounded three Dunsmuir hurlers into submission Sunday afternoon by sending out 16 base knocks and won a 9-6 victory over the invading Railroaders.

Chief of Police J. W. Mather of Dorris pitched the first ball to batter Mayor Hagelstein, also of Dorris, while Lynn Roycroft, Klamath recreational official, wore the big mitt behind the plate. This was the opening game of the 1940 season on new Tolbert park.

Lowell Brown, Klamath hurler, pitched flawless ball for seven innings, allowing the Railroaders but two singles. In the eighth, however, the big lefthander tired and the run-hungry Dunsmuirites slugged out three doubles and two singles to score four runs.

Manager Tolbert waived Brown to the dugout and Clyde Carlstrom went in for the relief trick. The Railroaders continued their rampage by collecting two doubles and a single in the ninth and running their score up to six. Dunsmuir's rally in the eighth and ninth brought the crowd to its feet time after time but the invaders were unable to overcome the big lead piled up earlier by the hard-hitting Lumberjacks.

Dorris-Klamath made short work of starting Pitcher Pemberton. The lefty pitched to only four batters who sent out two singles and a double along with a sacrifice. He was replaced by Monzo, star hurler for the Railroaders. Monzo coasted along fairly well until the fifth frame when Bernadou scored first on an error, scoring on Goldbar's double. R. McIntyre then homed over the left wall to bring the count to 5-0. The Lumberjacks added another run in the seventh and three more in the eighth with Bernadou's homer helping the cause along. Monzo went to the showers in the eighth and was replaced by Bill Marshall. Marshall retired the side without difficulty.

Harlan Pool, ex-coast leaguer, and Cava led the Dunsmuir hitters. Each collected three hits apiece. Goldbar with three doubles and two singles in five trips to the plate had a perfect day at bat. He was followed in hitting by Brooks, L. McIntyre and Fryer.

Next Sunday the Lumberjacks face the McCloud Loggers at Dorris and run into a lineup containing seven St. Mary's stars.

Thomas Resigns CHS Coach Post

CHILOQUIN, (Special)—Frank Thomas, coach at Chiloquin high school for the past two years, has accepted the post of head coach of the athletic department of Junction City high school, effective next year. Chiloquin athletic teams have enjoyed unusual success under his direction for the past two years.

This past year has been the most successful in the history of Chiloquin high school in the line of athletics. Under Thomas' supervision CHS teams took the county championships in two of the three major sports, basketball and track, and tied for second honors in football. The past football season produced the best record since the innovation of that sport four years ago. Only two conference games were lost, placing the team high above its former standings with a tie for second place.

In basketball the local quintet was far superior to other county opposition and placed first with little difficulty. The team made two road trips and defeated several much larger class A schools. Coach Thomas' team won third place at the Southern Oregon tournament at Ashland. It scored more points in any one game than any other school, and at the close of the tournament had a larger point total than any other team. One team member from CHS squad was picked for each of the first and second All-Star teams of the tournament.

In track, for the first time in seven years Chiloquin steamrolled its way to the county championship by averaging at least a second place in each event at the county meet. Previously, the cinder squad placed second to Klamath Falls in the 20-30 meet and was far ahead of other competition.

INDIANS NAB RELAYS OVER TROY SQUAD

FRESNO, Calif., May 13 (UP)—Stanford avenged its dual track meet loss to Southern California Saturday night by winning the 14th annual west coast relays.

The scores were: Stanford, 70 5/8; Southern California, 63 3/4; UCLA, 32 5/8; Fresno, 8; College of Pacific, 4; San Jose, 2, and San Diego State, 2.

Compton was the junior college champion and Bakersfield won the high school division. With only the pole vault unfinished, Stanford had massed 70 1/2 points, more than enough to topple the defending Trojans. USC had won the relays in 1939 and 1938, tied with Stanford in 1937, and scored triumphs from 1929 through 1935.

Southern California had 56 points without the pole vault, which turned out to be a four-way battle between Dudley, of USC, Hoffman of Fresno State and two invitation entrants, Cornelius (Dutch) Warmerdam, unofficial world's record holder at 15 feet, and Earle Meadows, former Trojan and holder of the recognized world mark at 14-11.

Stanford's strength was in the relay events, with victories in the mile, 880, two-mile and 440-yard four-man events. The Trojans made an auspicious start by nabbing the spectacular medley relay, featuring a stretch victory by Trojan Louis Zamperini over Stanford's Paul Moore.

Stan Anderson, Stanford's giant weightman, won the shotput and discus, while Clyde Jeffrey scored the other first place for the Indians with a 9.5 victory in the 100-yard dash.

Trojan first place winners were Degroot in the javelin, Hommel in the high hurdles, Wilson in the high jump, and Dills in the pole vault.

There were 10 west coast relays records broken, of which two were national JC marks. Warmerdam and Meadows tried unsuccessfully for a new world's pole vault record at 15 feet 2 inches. Warmerdam cleared 14 feet 6 inches, and Meadows 14 feet 2 inches.

Louis Zamperini, USC's national champion miler, outran Stanford's Paul Moore in a stretch battle to win the event by a scant foot. The time was 10:08.5.

Enters 7-Man Battle Royal

Negotiating plans that will probably culminate in the erection of a \$5000 lighting system at Rotary park for use this summer, directors of the Klamath Softball association, headed by Lynn Roycroft, president, Saturday were mulling over arrangements that will get the quickest results because initial contests of the 16-team loop are scheduled to get underway Monday night, June 3.

With opening night games little more than three weeks away and a great deal of work left to be completed before lights can be installed by a Copco crew, association officials realize the importance of rapid and cooperative efforts and every possible angle is being investigated by league directors to speed progress on the project so that there will be no delay in the 1940 softball program.

A first class sprinkling system is to be installed this year with the idea that the field, eventually to be used for night baseball contests, will be turfed by next summer. It is the intention, too, of Klamath Softball directors to erect a high board fence around the park just as soon as the field is sufficiently graded.

Spec Murray, city recreation director and a director of the softball association, announced Saturday that there are still a number of choice advertising spots left for merchants who wish to buy space to have their ads listed on the fence inside the park. Upwards of 20,000 people are expected to witness softball games and other programs at the new field this summer. Money taken in from the sale of advertising space will probably defray the expense of building the fence.

Wasco Ball Picked
President Roycroft stated Saturday that league directors have met and selected the Wasco softball, sold by the Western Auto Supply company, as the official league ball for the 1940 season. The Wasco ball will be used in all league games this summer. Entry fees of the 16 teams admitted to the conference this year have been received, according to Estin Kiger, secretary.

YANKS BOUNCE FROM BOTTOM WITH 4-0 WIN OVER BOSTONS

The New York Yankees still are to be reckoned with in the American league pennant race. The way they bounced up from the bottom of the standings Sunday to shut out the Boston Red Sox 4-0, was a forceful performance.

Red Ruffing whipped out that old fast ball and spread six hits smartly, struck out eight and walked only two. His teammates gave him superb support—no errors and two double plays.

In the National league the out-in-front Cincinnati Reds beat the St. Louis Cardinals 7-1 and 13-4 in a doubleheader.

The double victory increased the Reds' margin to a full game over Brooklyn even though the Dodgers defeated the Phillies 5-3 with Fred Fitzsimmons' knuckleballing getting credit.

The New York Giants edged out the Boston Bees 3-2. Hal Schumacher was effective for seven innings, fanning eight.

The Chicago Cubs plastered another defeat on the Pittsburgh Pirates 7-5 when Bill Herman hit a three-run homer in the eighth. Dizzy Dean started on the mound, gave up a homer in the first inning and was belted out in the second.

The Cleveland Indians were thumped 5-2 by the St. Louis Browns, with Elden Auker rationing nine hits off his submarine ball.

The Chicago White Sox tamed the Detroit Tigers 4-3 in spite of home runs by Pinky Higgins and Dick Bartell.

Johnny Babich achieved his fourth victory against one defeat as the Philadelphia Athletics whipped the Washington Senators 4-2.
