Not Because He Needs It

HERE'S one thing that can be said about voting that is fair and must appeal to every person who thinks: LET'S NOT VOTE FOR ANYBODY BECAUSE HE NEEDS THE JOB.

Putting people in office because they need the job has been tried time and again, and the experience has been anything but beneficial to public business.

Now it is entirely possible that there are cases where the person who needs the job also is well qualified to handle it. Those who believe that about a candidate are certainly justified in voting for him.

But the prime factor should be his qualifications, not his economic condition.

Following the same principle, it is poor business to reject a well-qualified candidate, because he doesn't need the job in order to make his living.

If he has retained the "common touch," the fact that a candidate has been successful in private life is ordinarily a factor in his favor. It means that he has ability, initiative and resourcefulness that should be beneficial to the public business he serves. In offices of poor pay but great responsibility, it means that he will probably be above the temptations that scheming interests so frequently throw in the way of financially strained persons in such offices.

Boiling it all down, the real problem is to give to the public business the services of the best personnel available. This is what the conscientious voter should do at election time.

A republican has suggested that we recount here what few outright recommendations we have made concerning certain party offices. We have recommended Ralph Cate for national committeeman, Leslie M. Scott for state treasurer, and Arthur Schaupp and Archie McGowan for delegates from the second district to the national convention.

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, May 16—A

rather complete republican delegate nose-count has now been finished by this column with the help of many authorities. The results show:

Dewey 290
Taft 266
Vandenberg 114
Others 296
Doubtful 35
Necessary to nominate 501.

This is the prospect for the first ballot as of today.

A varying amount of guesswork has been required in some of the uninstructed delegations but the guessing has been done by those best able to do it and the result presents a general picture which is trustworthy.

DEWEY VOTES

The nose-count gives the young prosecuting candidate from New York: California 10, Colorado 4, Florida 8, Idaho 8, Illinois 58, Indiana 6, Kentucky 6, Maryland 16, Minnesota 4, Missouri 8, Montana 2, Nebraska 14, New Jersey 26, New Mexico 2, New York 60, North Carolina 5, Oklahoma 8, South Dakota 2, Tennessee 3, Vermont 2, Virginia 6, Washington 8, Wisconsin 24.

As the balloting progresses, Dewey seems likely to lose some in New Jersey, New York, Maryland and perhaps elsewhere. In Wisconsin, Nebraska and Illinois there are also a few Dewey delegates whose personal inclinations do not bind them strongly.

TAFT SUPPORT

The Taft total includes: Alabama 13, Arkansas 12, Delaware 6, Florida 4, Georgia 14, Kentucky 10, Mississippi 11, Missouri 16, Montana 6, New Jersey 6, North Carolina 18, Ohio 52, Oklahoma 14, Rhode Island 8, Tennessee 15, Texas 26, Vermont 7, Virginia 12, West Virginia 16.

How long the Ohioan can keep these is problematical, but few seem likely to go to Dewey at any time.

VANDEMBERG TOTAL

Vandenberg's somewhat shaker total includes: Kentucky 6, Michigan 38, Minnesota 18, Missouri 6, Montana 6, New Mexico 4, North Dakota 8, South Dakota 6, Utah 8, Washington 8 and Wyoming 6.

Some of these delegates might possibly go to Dewey eventually, including the entire Michigan delegation where Dewey has wide second choice strength.

Even so, Dewey cannot look forward today to more than 50 from this source. The gain after early balloting would hardly make up for what he can expect to lose from his own delegations at that time.

Thus his chance of acquiring the 211 votes he needs for the nomination today would not seem to be improved by his prospects for Vandenberg acquisitions.

OTHER ENTRIES

Delegations now otherwise controlled include: Arizona 6, California 34, Colorado 8, Connecticut 16 (Baldwin), Indiana 22, Iowa 22 (Hanford McVider), Kansas 18 (Capper-Landon), Maine 13 (Bridges), Massachusetts 34 (Saltonstall), Nevada 6, New Hampshire 8 (Bridges), New York 32 (Barton-Gannett), Oregon 10 (McNary), Pennsylvania 72 (James).

The bulk of this support is directed by Herbert Hoover, the Landon forces, Dewey's liberal foe in New York, Kenneth Simpson and the James-Pew group in Pennsylvania. Only the Landon crowd, among these groups,

has been at all friendly to Dewey. The Landonites will have apparently something over 50 votes largely from Kansas and Massachusetts—not enough to nominate Dewey.

To get the nomination, Dewey must acquire the Hoover or the James-Pew strength, or both. His prospects in this respect are something less than halfway bright at this stage.

Therefore his nomination for the first place on the ticket is distinctly unlikely at the present moment, although he could presumably be nominated nearly unanimously for second place. This situation could change automatically at any time in the

next five weeks that the two reluctant forces change their minds.

For the present the nose-count suggests Dewey will get the first run at the convention. Taft the second and the nomination is still in the air.

The 35 listed doubtful delegates include 12 contested in Louisiana, 10 contested in South Carolina, and the 13 territorial delegates whose preferences are not usually important. No Wilkie strength is shown, because his movement started only the past two weeks. Also his hopes lie outside the contest of the leading candidates and are reserved for later ballots when compromising will be in order.

High School Straw Poll Puts Vandenberg, Ashurst in Lead

If the high school straw poll of Wednesday is any indication of general county balloting, Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst and Attorney David R. Vandenberg will be running neck and neck when the votes are in Friday night. Both, under those circumstances, would be nominated for the circuit judgeship.

ASHURST LASHED IN PUBLIC TALK

In a bitter, emotion-packed speech, Charles A. Paulk last night charged Circuit Court Judge Edward B. Ashurst with interference in the duties of city officials.

Paulk, who spoke to the public at the city library, said, "He (the judge) has criticized some central officials and officers of this city, and when he does such as that he has not taken his oath of office as he says and he has overstepped his oath of office and has disqualified himself as circuit judge of this city."

Paulk also cited the number of affidavits of prejudice that have been filed while Judge Ashurst has presided on the circuit court bench.

Alluding to the cost of bringing in outside judges to try the cases on which the venue had thus been changed, Paulk asked, "Don't you think it's a pretty dear price to pay outside judges because Ashurst is unqualified to fill the office? . . . Apparently, as the judges have to come in from the outside, we must be paying double what we should be paying."

"Isn't it a fact that he is stepping out of his duty as judge when he takes the bit into his teeth to clean up the town?" Paulk asked, speaking of Judge Ashurst's current campaign.

ICE AGE NEVER ENDED

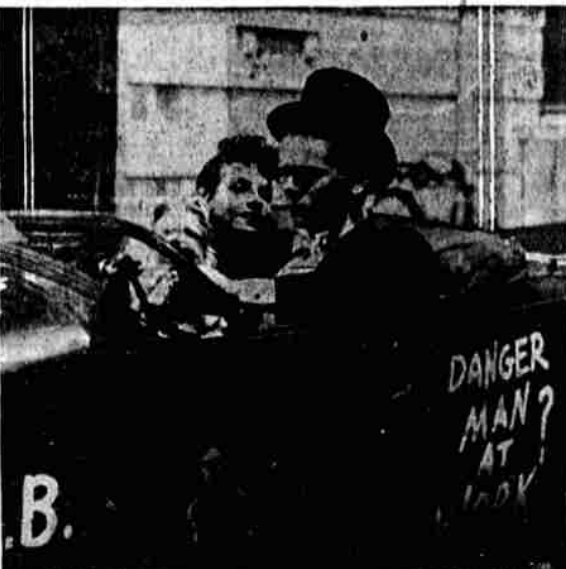
