NAZIS SAY KAISER FREE TO RETURN

BERLIN, May 16 (UP)—Former Kaiser Wilhelm is welcome to return at any time to the land for which he, like Adolf Hitler, once sought "a place in the sun," a Nazi spokesman said Wednesday.

But the warlord of another era apparently wanted nothing more than to live out his life at the Dutch estate at Doorn to which he fled two days before the armistice in 1918.

The 81-year-old Wilhelm was said to have turned down an offer by the Dutch government to move him out of the path of the German war machine.

The spokesman said that the former kaiser "naturally is safe" and that German troops knew he lived in Doorn and undoubtedly saw to it that nothing happened to him. The fighting drew near enough to his estate for him to hear again the rattle of guns, but Nazis said the town itself was spared.

"He is a German citizen," the spokesman said, "and possesses large estates in Germany to which he is welcome to return any time he wishes. The German government has not been in contact with him, for his freedom of movement never has been in question."

Huge Amount of Spoils Taken From Netherlands By Hitler War Machine

LONDON, May 16 (UP)—Bullion valued at 26,000,000 pounds sterling, many shipyards, warships under construction and supplies of oil and tin today were estimated here to be among the spoils of war gained by the Germans in The Netherlands.

Thirty-five to 40 shipyards were believed to have fallen to the Germans; also 100,000 tons of oil and from two to three thousand tons of tin.

Ships Taken
The warships under construction in Flushing, which is in the still-resisting province of Zeeland but which the nazis are expected to win, and in Rotterdam include three cruisers, four destroyers, seven submarines and 10 minesweepers.

While it is questionable how successful the Germans will be in speeding up construction of these vessels, it is noteworthy that Danish shipyards reportedly already are working for Germany.

Completed units of the Dutch navy, including two cruisers, and a number of submarines, gunboats, torpedo boats and minesweepers, joined the allies. The major portion of the Dutch fleet is in the Dutch East Indies.

Bullion Won
Although the Germans are believed to have won Dutch bullion valued at 26,000,000 sterling, The Netherlands succeeded in shipping an estimated 30,000,000 sterling in bullion to England just before the invasion.

Months ago bullion worth 117,000,000 sterling was sent abroad, mostly to the United States.

Most of The Netherlands' 330,000 tons of oil on hand at the time of the invasion was destroyed before the surrender. In many places the Dutch opened pipes normally used to fuel ships so that the oil poured into canals and rivers. In other places oil stores were destroyed by German bombs or by the Dutch setting them afire.

Germany will gain much vegetable and whale oil and margarine but this is offset by the drowning of thousands of head of cattle when the flood defenses were opened.

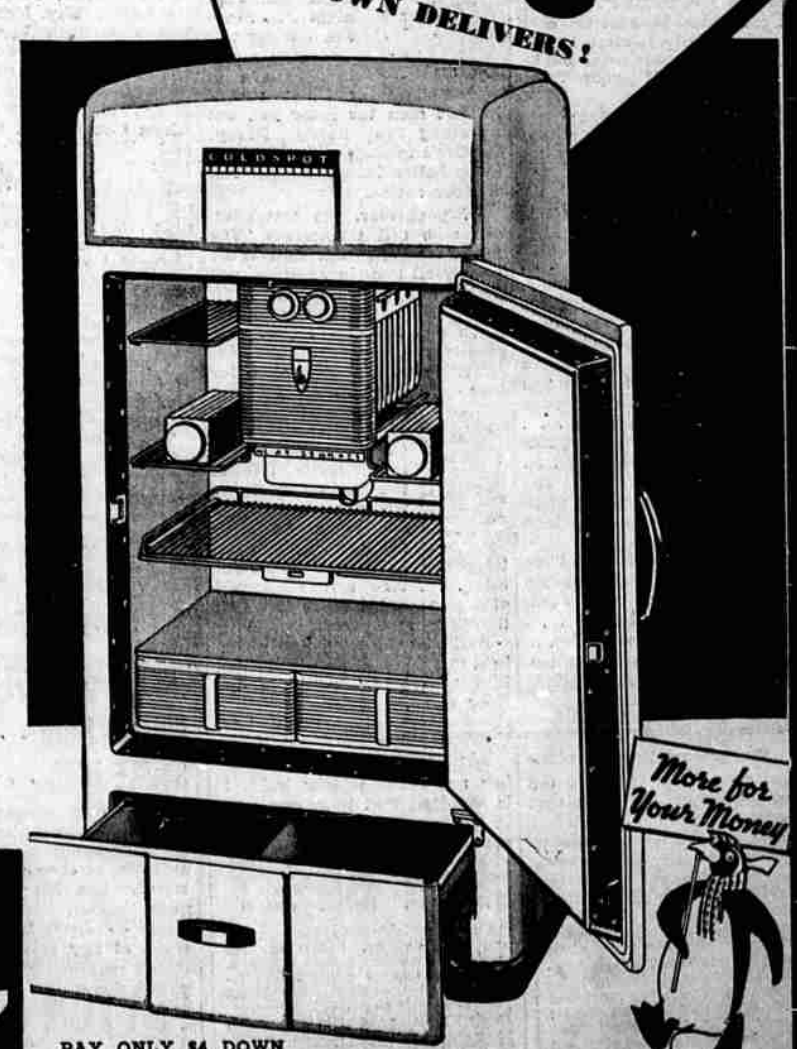
