PLANS DELAYED FOR TULELAKE WATER SYSTEM

TULELAKE—Delay in the delivery of plans and specifications for the proposed city water and sewage systems, promised by the city's engineer, Edward Husey and C. A. Postlethwaite, San Francisco, is being investigated this week by Mayor Lou Booth and councilmen A. A. Rodenberger, J. W. Carlisle, J. T. Gropper and City Attorney Charles Lederer who are in the bay region. Papers on the project were supposed to have been in the hands of the council the first of the week and a call on sale of bonds or a action for bids can be taken until the plans are delivered and checked by city officials. Specifications for the pumping unit only have been delivered to date.

Axel Anderson will serve the city as water master during the irrigation season, to regulate use of water by all property owners. Councilman Otis Roper made a motion to draw up an agreement to be signed by every resident to whom water is delivered, that controversies over delivery may be avoided as in past years. A charge of \$4.00 a lot will be made.

P. C. Bergeman appeared before the council in the interest of Peyton and company who offered to sell to the city 4000 gallons of oil to be used for settling dust on Main street, for \$240. Informing that only \$100 was available in city funds, Bergeman offered to be personally responsible for soliciting funds for the remainder and by Tuesday night had turned in \$120.50 to Harold Roath, city clerk.

A scale of wages to be offered to those employed on the city improvement projects will be worked out by the council and by John Ross of the state employment service before actual construction gets under way.

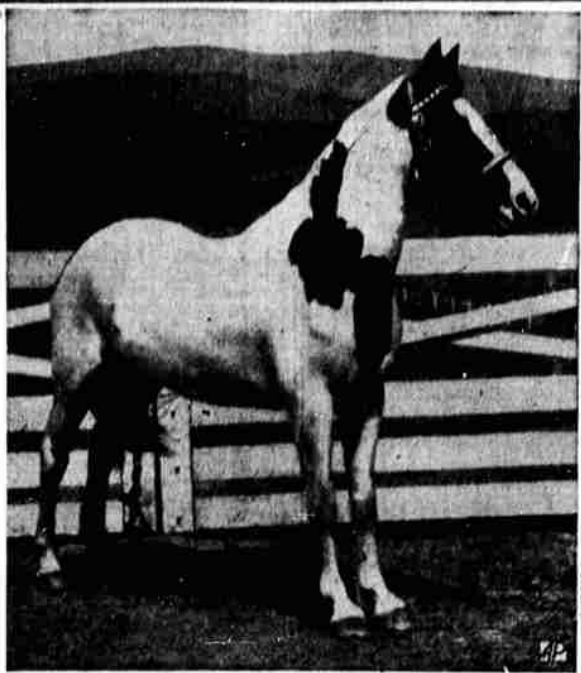

INCREASE NOTED IN AAA SIGN-UP

Noticeable increase in participation in the 1940 AAA farm program is indicated by a sign-up just completed throughout Oregon counties, according to the state agricultural conservation office in Corvallis.

N. C. Donaldson, state executive said that 35,800 farmers signed "farm plan sheets" showing how they are adapting the program to this year's farming operations. These farmers operate a total of 47,400 tracts of land. This compares with 41,000 tracts in the program last year.

Announcement was also made that national, state and county wheat allotments for 1941 will be given out this month. Farmer committees in each county will be in charge of determining individual allotments.

WHEAT RECOVERS PART OF LOSSES

CHICAGO, May 16 (AP)—After three consecutive sessions of sharply lower prices, the wheat market today righted itself on the strength of buying from consuming interests, exporters and investors and developed strong recovery power.

Extremely rapid and wide price fluctuations continued to characterize trading, with quotations more than two cents net lower at times, but the market closed strong with net gains ranging up to 3 to more than 4 cents.

At early lows wheat values showed losses of 25 cents a bushel since the start of trading on Monday. Closing figures, however, were more than 6 cents above these lows.

Wheat finished 3-4½ cents higher than yesterday, May 90c; July 89½-89c; corn 3½-4½c higher, May 63½c; July 63½c; oats 14½-15c up and rye 3½-4c higher.
