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STOCKS CRASH 2 TO 9 POINTS AS WAR WORSE

NEW YORK, May 17 (AP)—Leading stocks crashed through support levels today for losses of 2 to more than 9 points as trading forces were seized with another attack of "war nerves."

An early attempt to extend yesterday's late rally quickly faded. Steels and aircrafts, up at the start, were among the first to tumble and from then on were the worst. The ticker tape frequently was late as heavy offerings swamped the recording machinery. In the speediest dealings of the session in the final half-hour, extreme declines were substantially reduced in most cases.
