Weekend Roundup

ANOTHER election is passed, and this newspaper today offers congratulations to the winners. To the losers, a word of sympathy for their disappointment and felicitations for the clean campaign.

The general tenor of the entire campaign was wholesome. It is true there was heat in one contest, and some harsh words were spoken. But these were from intensely interested citizens, rather than candidates. There is every good reason to forget what rancor may have been engendered, and to realize that the people have made decisions that cannot be changed by argument.

As has been anticipated, the vote was not up to the size it should be in an election of such importance. Indications at this writing are that it passed 41 per cent of the registered vote. In view of pre-election apathy toward everything but the circuit judge contest, that is somewhat more than most observers expected.

We do not believe it is healthy for interest to concentrate so completely on one contest as it did in the campaign now at an end. It tends to divert interest from other election issues of vital importance.

Many persons assisted The Herald and News in keeping up a running fire of election returns throughout election evening, until all contests were decided. To these, we express our appreciation. Doing an election job is a harrowing business, but it has its compensations. One of these is that it attracts hundreds of friends to the newspaper offices, and that is one reason we undertake to give a spot election service. Our system is well organized, and our returns are never headed.

Fine spring weather has come to the Klamath country, and the itch for the hills is overpowering a lot of local folk of both sexes. When we consider our freedom for leisure and enjoyment, we are gripped with sympathy for persons in other lands whose homes have been destroyed, whose families and friends have been broken by the death and destruction of war.

One little way to express that sympathy is to give to the American Red Cross drive for foreign relief, which has opened in Klamath county. Our quota is \$2000, and it should be easily reached among the generous people of this community. The suffering that we know is going on in war countries beggars the imagination.

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, May 18—The president's new plane-mindfulness, as disclosed in his message, can be traced to latest confidential figures he has received on German superiority in the air. One of his excellent advisers maintains that at the rate of destruction the first few days of the latest German invasion, most of the allied planes could be gone in a week. This is an extreme conclusion, but the plane production status of the belligerents today (somehow extracted from Europe by the most authentic sources here) showed it far less extreme than it sounds.

Germany is producing 4000 planes a month with plans calling for 5000 by September 1; Great Britain lags at less than 1000 per month (she was putting out 1200 last March) and France at 300—together about one-third the German total. The president knew but did not disclose that Germany is producing more than all other nations of the world combined.

Of the 6000 planes which the allies ordered in this country, only 2000 have been delivered in a year. They can only get 1000 more during the summer, these having been ordered last year. Their orders of the past few weeks for the latest models will not be delivered for eight to twelve more months.

DARK IN 1914
The Germans held practically the same superiority in the early days of the last war, not in planes then but in artillery and military machines. It looked just about as dark for the allies then. Forty-four years earlier, however, the result was the opposite when much of the French army was bottled up and forced to hoist the white flag at Sedan 54 days after German mobilization.

CAUGHT IN CURRENT
The broadcast enthusiasm of congressmen for Mr. Roosevelt's staggering program was somewhat deceptive.

One mid-western house member who dictated an approving statement to a group of newsmen, afterward made a far different statement of his personal opinion off the record.

"There are many things about this I do not like," he said. "For one thing the whole tone sounds too much like a declaration of war on the side of the allies. The request for a \$200,000,000 blank check drawn by congress to the president's order does not conform to my conception of how things should be done either."

STAGGERING COST
A house committee chairman sat down with his pencil for

some private figuring and reached the unbelievable conclusion that it would cost \$15,000,000,000—nearly twice the whole national budget—to build and maintain for a year the 50,000 planes which Mr. Roosevelt said he wanted eventually. The legislator figured war time replacements would require 5000 planes a month, 2 and 1/2 engines to a plane, pilots, equipment, housing, etc.

While his dismaying estimates were rough and inexact, the White House has only made an open off-the-record-secret of its intention to seek further funds later.

COAL DID IT
Hitler bottled Denmark news so completely by his invasion that no trustworthy accounts of what happened there have been available. Nevertheless you may trust this following thumbnail account of the coup:

The Danes were short of coal due to the blockade and asked Hitler for some of the German production in this single line in which he has a surplus. The 5 shiploads of German coal arrived in the harbor at Copenhagen, but the night before they were to be unloaded the German minister awakened the Danish minister at 3 a. m., with an ultimatum presenting 13 points. The Danish foreign minister managed to get the cabinet together with the king by 4:30 a. m., but before they could even enter upon a discussion of the German demands, the 5 shiploads of "coal" landed their hidden cargoes of nazi troopers and German planes appeared over Copenhagen in droves.

These days require optimism, but one division of the state

department seems to be overdoing it. While Hitler's hordes dashed across Belgium the past week, the trade treaty section has been working on the proposed reciprocal trade arrangement with the Belgian government.

HOOPERS SELL BIG RANCH TO SONS, PLAN LONG TRIP

Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Hooper, pioneer residents of this section, have sold their 1000-acre ranch to their two sons, J. C. and B. B. Hooper, and Friday left on an extended motor trip through the south. They will also visit the New York Worlds Fair before returning to Oakland, Calif., where they will make their home. Mr. and Mrs. Hooper were accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Hooper on the journey.

The Hoopers came to this district in 1905 and settled in Midland where they operated their holdings. They were interested principally in the cattle business and much of their ranch was in grazing land.

MAN FINED ON LIQUOR CHARGE

Lewis Zattlin drew a fine of 30 days in the city jail when he entered a plea of guilty to the charge of selling of liquor to Indians. He appeared before Police Judge Carl K. Cook on Saturday.

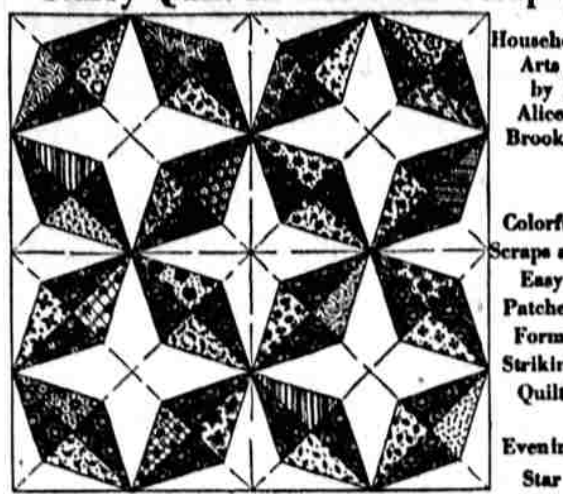

Anti-Parachute Unit Formed on Pacific Coast

NAPA, Calif., May 18 (UP)—The first volunteer anti-parachute combat unit on the Pacific coast was formed here today when the Napa Rifle and Pistol club enrolled its members and offered the services of the group to the government for use in combatting any possible invasion of the Mare island navy yard and the east San Francisco bay oil refining and industrial area.

Dr. Jutro A. Frost, president of the club, telegraphed the war and navy departments offering the services of his organization to combat any possible effort to land hostile troops by parachute in the east bay area.

Frost said his anti-parachute group would be modeled after the British organization for similar defense.

Landon Pledges Fullest Support For Defense Bill

WARRENSBURG, Mo., May 18 (UP)—Alf M. Landon, titular head of the republican party, today pledged his support to the president "in his announced efforts to strengthen the nation against attack."
