

Library Club Flower Show Huge Success

Scores of Entries Draw Praise From Many Visitors At Annual Spring Exhibit Monday in Library

An outstanding flower show from many angles was that presented to the public by the Klamath Falls Woman's Library club when scores of lovely blossoms, arrangements, and displays were shown in the main auditorium of the public library Monday afternoon, bringing to a close a successful year from the standpoint of membership and efforts of the garden lovers in the group.

Chairman of the show was Mrs. Lowell Kaup, who was assisted by a number of garden group members. Judge of the spring show was Mrs. Daniel Heffner of Portland, who had a difficult time in choosing between the many exhibits, both specimen and arrangement entries.

Trophy award went to Miss Beverly Ricker whose charming arrangement of white lilacs used as a background for a white madonna in a flat bowl, was chosen as outstanding. Miss Ricker also reaped other awards for her unusual entries.

Mrs. G. A. Krause won high honors for points garnered during the day for her interesting entries. Second place went to Mrs. Ernest D. Lamb; third, Miss Beverly Ricker; fourth, Mrs. A. G. Proctor; fifth, Mrs. George H. Goehring; sixth, Mrs. Hugh Campbell; seventh, Mrs. T. B. Watters; eighth, Mrs. William Scott.

Particularly interesting at the affair were the organization exhibits. First prize went to the Kiwanis club; second, Soroptimists; third, Camp Fire Girls; honorable mention, Sojourners, Boy Scouts, and chamber of commerce.

In one entry, which was not in competition, exhibitors entered arrangements inspired by a book, song, or poem.
