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RED CROSS SENDS FUND TO WAR ZONE

SAN FRANCISCO, May 20—

The American Red Cross has cabled \$100,000 each to the Belgian Red Cross and to the Netherlands Red Cross for immediate relief purposes for the military and civilian wounded in Belgium and Holland, it was announced today by Pacific area headquarters here.

The Red Cross last week asked the nation to contribute promptly and generously to a \$10,000,000 Red Cross war relief fund. The sum of \$100,000 cabled through American Ambassador John Cudahy to the Belgian Red Cross was in answer to the following cablegram from President B. Nolf of the Belgian Red Cross in reply to Chairman H. Davis' message offering aid.

"Deeply moved by your generous action. We wish to express our profound gratitude. Needs of the Belgian Red Cross are considerable. Will be very happy to receive contributions in money and in automobile transport equipment. We beg of you to believe in our grateful sentiments." President Nolf, Belgian Red Cross.

The \$100,000 sent to the Netherlands through the American Minister George A. Gordon will be delivered to Princess Juliana, president of the Netherlands Red Cross society.
