Oregon's Labor Camp Plan Cares for 1067 Families

Oregon's farm family labor camp program for 1940 provides housing, sanitary and social facilities for a maximum of 1067 families following seasonal agricultural work in nine specially crop areas, announces Walter A. Duffy, regional director, Farm Security administration.

"Two units are now open to all migratory farm families and non-local families engaged in seasonal agricultural labor, with three additional units scheduled for opening by May 15," Duffy said.

Location, facilities available and crops being served follow: Dayton standard camp, four miles south of Dayton on highway 233—176 family shelters, 44 tent platforms and 47 three-room labor homes, with community facilities including an assembly building; building with laundry and shower equipment; first aid and child clinic and machine shop. Crops include berries, small fruits, prunes, nuts and some hops within a 20-mile radius.

Nyssa mobile unit, three miles west of Nyssa—200 tent platforms with 125 tents and community facilities including an assembly tent, first aid and child clinic, laundry, shower and sanitary units. Serves sugar beets and potatoes.

"Three more mobile units are scheduled for opening by May 15, including one at the east city limits of Athena for canning peas; a unit on the Friday ranch two miles northwest of Banks for strawberries; and the third bordering the east city limits of Gresham for raspberries and blackberries," said Duffy.

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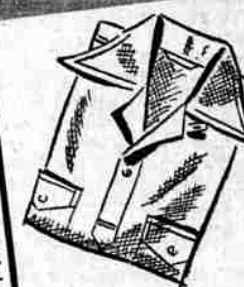
