were said to have reached the historic Somme battlefield of 1918.

Driven Back—French military authorities admitted the enemy was attacking furiously in the region east of Cambrai, only 70 miles from the channel port of Dunkerque (Dunkirk)—just across the channel from Dover, England.

The Nazi high command, in claiming these successes, said the British were being driven back under forced march toward the English channel.

The allies suffered "the heaviest losses... especially armored troops," the high command declared.

Dread German Stuka (dive bomber) plane squadrons, in wave on wave, were reported to have destroyed an armored allied column racing north from Leen, at the southwest tip of the Meuse river front, to combat the German advance in the St. Quentin sector.

The allied reinforcements, it was said, were forced to turn back.

reroute all trains on a line which runs through Mexico. El Centro, Brawley and Cal-exico believed sufficient reserves were on hand to last up to 10 days with economical use, but 100,000-gallon water tanks in Holtville and Imperial were toppled and Mexico used much of its supply fighting a fire which destroyed the ancient international hotel.

The eight victims of four severe shocks in a three-hour period starting at 8:36 p. m. (PST) Saturday were listed as Mrs. Alma Ruth Mullings, 25, her two daughters, Loy, 6, and Welora, 3, and Juanita Blevins, 18, all of Imperial; John Clifford Moore, 21, of Heber; Abel Portillo, 75, Brawley, and Manuel Garcia, 25, and an unidentified Chinese, both of Mexicali.

IMPERIAL, Calif., May 20 (P)—When the Imperial high school yearbook comes out next month, the inscription under one name will read: "She died trying to save a child."

Juanita Blevins, 18, was in a market building when the first earth shock occurred Saturday night. Witnesses said she saw Mrs. Alma Ruth Mullings struggling to carry Loy, 6, and Welora Mullings, 3, to safety. Juanita turned to carry one of the girls, but a shower of bricks buried them. All four died.

Mrs. Mullings' husband, Ben, was in the same building and carried their son Joel, 4, to safety.
