Rev. M. H. Roach and Rev. Lawrence Mitchellmore will be conference directors. Mrs. Herman S. Reichard of Grants Pass will be registrar and Mrs. Reed Miller, dean of girls. Among those on the faculty will be Rev. Elmer E. Rosenkilde, Rev. and Mrs. Merle F. Ramage, Rev. and Mrs. J. Theodore Burns, Reedport, Rev. A. Theodore Smith, Klamath Falls, Helen F. Whitaker, North Bend, Mrs. E. F. McFarland, Cottage Grove, Rev. Paul A. Tidball of Glendale, Rev. James H. Edgar, Ashland, Rev. H. S. Reichard, Grants Pass, and Rev. James Thomson, Seattle.

Christian education topics will be taught and special interest groups conducted in nature study, game making, orchestra leadership and others. Recreational facilities exist for swimming, tennis and baseball.

Rev. John K. Howard, Glendale, is business manager and treasurer and Rev. John W. Hoyt, Medford, is chairman of the Presbytery's committee on arrangements.

GANONG TO FILL CHAMBER VACANCY

William Ganong, Klamath Falls attorney, was elected by the board of directors of the Klamath county chamber of commerce to succeed R. C. Groesbeck, retiring after serving on the board for the past 17 years.

Ganong's acceptance was announced Wednesday by Earl Reynolds, chamber secretary. He has been active in irrigation affairs of the Klamath basin as well as in the legal profession.

Groesbeck, also a Klamath attorney, served as a director since 1923 and was president of the organization twice. He also served as national councillor to the United States chamber of commerce.

Groesbeck is resigning because of the press of other business, brought about by his recent appointment to the state board of higher education.

Ganong will serve out the unexpired term, which closes April 30, 1941.

Paralysis Sufferer Seeks to Form Group to Find Cure

"Nothing is incurable — the cure just hasn't been found."

That is the philosophy of Roger Carr, 1237 Webb avenue, Detroit, victim of multiple sclerosis, who by forming an organization of similar sufferers hopes to disprove the claims that the disease is both rare and incurable.

Multiple sclerosis is a disease more commonly known as "creeping paralysis."

In furtherance of a survey being conducted by Carr, he has appealed to The Herald and News to assist in locating any cases in this section. He is attempting to contact all victims of the malady in the United States and already has located 516 such cases.

Offers Self For Experiments

"Seven years ago, after extensive hospital examination, I was told that I had multiple

sclerosis, which is creeping paralysis. They said that it was rare and incurable and I at once started making a study of it. When I found that nothing was known about it, I offered myself as a human guinea pig, through the newspapers. Many things have been tried on me and at the present time, I am being treated by a physician in Toronto, Ontario. I am now in contact with 388 cases like mine. The burst of publicity that was responsible for these cases coming to light, took place in Seattle, Wash., while I was visiting there. For that reason, most of the cases are in that vicinity. If this means anything, there must be thousands of such cases and that is what I am trying to find out.

"Recently, Lou Gehrig has come down with this trouble and when I read that they were

going to give him shots in the spine, I at once wrote him a letter and told him that they had done this to me and nearly killed me. He sent me a very nice letter in reply and said that he was not going to take the spinal shots.

"Anything that is tried with this trouble, is strictly experimental and I am trying to form a group, so that we can get in touch with each other and know what is being tried. If we, the afflicted, could only join forces, it would limit the experiments that are not helping and save a lot of false hopes, that can be

so damaging. After each experiment that I underwent, I was worse, or thought I was, the let down was so great."

OVERNIGHT LODGING AT PARK SUSPENDED

Overnight accommodations which have been available throughout the winter months at park headquarters in Crater Lake national park will not be available during the remainder of this spring season, according to a recent announcement from the office of Superintendent Leavitt. The sleeping quarters, which have been available

throughout the winter are to be used by employees engaged in opening park facilities for the summer season.

Meal facilities and emergency auto supplies will be available at park headquarters until June 8 on which date the Crater Lake National Park company will open its facilities at the lodge.

Superintendent Leavitt also announces that weather conditions in the park have during the past week been favorable for rapid melting of the snow. An average of four feet of snow still remains at park headquarters with greater depths at higher elevations in the rim area. The rim village area is accessible from the south and west entrances. The north and east entrance roads including the rim drive will be open for travel the latter part of June or the first of July.
