

GROWTH SHOWN IN PAST YEAR BY GIRL SCOUTS

Following is the report of the organization committee of the Girl Scout council as submitted at the Monday meeting of the council by Mrs. J. P. Wells, chairman of the committee, in which is shown the rapid growth in girl scouting during the past year:

"At the first meeting of the organization committee, held January 16, 1939, a definite assignment of troops was made to each member of the committee, in order that they might have closer personal contact between the troops and committee members. This gives the committee member opportunity to familiarize herself with the work being done by her assigned troop, and also makes it possible for the troop to know whom to call upon for needed help.

"At that time we had seven intermediate Girl Scout troops, and two Brownie packs, with a total of 139 Girl Scouts.

"Today we have nine intermediate Girl Scout troops, seven Brownie packs, and one Marine troop, a total of 263 Girl Scouts, with another senior troop being organized.

"This shows a very substantial increase in scouting during the period covered by this report.

"We have 80 adult registered Girl Scout workers, including the Girl Scout council, leaders, assistant leaders and committees, to say nothing of those who are working but not registered at national.

"This fall we hope to be in closer contact with the troop committees. We feel that during the last year we have neglected to let these committees know how valuable their help could be to their leaders. These committees are glad to work if they know the task to be done. Practically every mother has something to give to girl scouting.

BAKER, KLAMATH LEAD FOR JOBS

SALEM, May 23 — Baker and Klamath Falls led the 21 offices of the state employment service in regular jobs with private industry during a busy week for Oregon workers, according to reports received by Director L. C. Stoll. With lumber industry mainly responsible, Klamath had 109 full-time jobs and 37 temporary, while Baker reported 103 regulars.

Of the 1993 placements from over the state, 734 were casuals, 452 regular private and 492 temporary. Private work accounted for the remainder of 315.

Ontario led in casual placements with 267 placed mainly in beet fields as casual workers and 33 additional from registered farm help. In total placement Portland led with 355, Ontario 333 and Albany 203, mostly turkey pickers.

TWO SCHOLARSHIPS GIVEN GRADUATES OF KLAMATH HIGH

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 23 (Special) — Mary Radcliffe and Harold Uhlig, members of the spring graduating class of Klamath Union high school, will attend OSC next fall as recipients of state board of higher education scholarships.

Selected by the high school contact committee, the students rank in the upper third of a class of 252 in scholarship and were recommended without qualification for the honor by their high school principal and dean of boys.

The winners have participated in extra-curricular activities as well as maintaining high scholastic records. They belong to the honor society, tennis club and student forum.

Miss Radcliffe will major in science at Oregon State. Uhlig plans to specialize in engineering. Each will enroll for the opening of Freshman week, September 23.

BRITISH DUKE LIVES THROUGH AIR RAIDS

(Editor's note: Drew Middleton, Associated Press staff correspondent, has just returned to England after a tour with the British expeditionary force on the continent.)

LONDON, May 23 (AP)—The Duke of Gloucester narrowly escaped death in an air raid on a French town Sunday night. The hotel in which he was staying was hit by two German bombs. A third exploded in the roadway outside.

I was a hundred yards away when the bombs exploded, and

saw the duke, unshaken and calm, emerge from the cellar where he had had supper with friends among the cavalry officers.

A short time later he helped get out messages to general headquarters, working side by side at an improvised desk with a grizzled top sergeant while a burning truck lit the street.

This was the fourth bombing the soldierly third son of the late King George V has undergone. Once he was wounded in the right hand by a bomb splinter. Now he offers his left hand in greeting. Still "Henry" to old friends, he is popular with all ranks.

The morning after the bombing he told me he was "getting used to it" and he commented: "The Boche put on quite a show for us, didn't he?"

CROP CONDITIONS SAID IMPROVING

PORTLAND, May 23 (AP)—The government weather bureau found Oregon crops progressing satisfactorily Wednesday in moderately warm, dry spring conditions.

The weekly crop and weather summary showed an abundance of sunshine for the period ending Tuesday, although some freezing temperatures occurred at higher elevations.

Winter wheat, barley and rye are heading and some early corn is up. Strawberries reached the market in increasing quantities. Fruit trees made good progress but the set is light in many of the northwest districts.

Hay crops are good but aphids damaged peas and vetch.

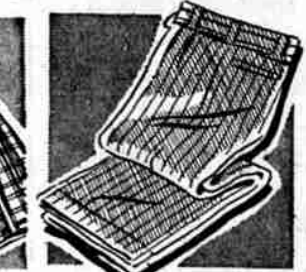

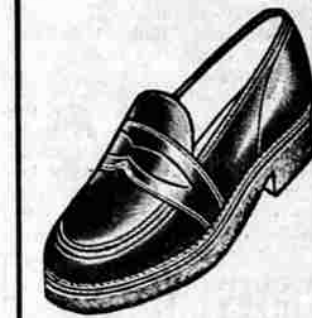

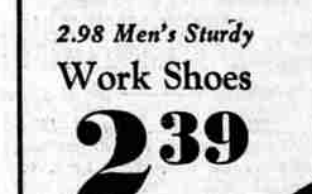
