PARACHUTISTS IN HOLLAND KEEP SECRET

UTRECHT, The Netherlands, May 25 (AP)—The pioneer parachute troops are the romantic mystery men of the German army, especially since they caused such havoc in Holland, and they're also silent men.

Especially are they reluctant to talk about the weapons they carry on their descents from the sky.

Quiet On Methods

I talked to three of a group which dropped down and held two tremendous bridges — at Moerdijk over Holland's Diep and south of Dordrecht — and while they seemed fond of their jobs, they were quiet about their methods.

The parachutists seized control of the bridges from the Dutch, they said, and held them against all attacks for three days and nights until land troops reached them.

Jumps Low

"We flew over high," said one who had received the Iron cross for his exploit. "We jumped from a low altitude so we wouldn't be in the air so long—probably 300 meters. There was a bad wind and some of the boys landed in the river."

The trooper, a short, freckled and about 22 from Hanover, said they immediately dug out shal-

low holes around the bridge and resisted all efforts to dislodge them. Their object was to prevent the Dutch from blowing up the bridges each about a mile long—one a railroad bridge and the other on a highway.

He and his two companions, obviously proud of their success, declined to say what weapons they used or whether they relied wholly on the light machine guns which were dropped in separate chutes.

Position Bombard

The Hanover boy said two British planes bombed them. Craters in the soft earth around the bridge showed where the bombs had fallen.

A little distance from the Moerdijk bridge, a small group of men in civilian clothes was clustered around 13 fresh graves marked with wooden crosses. Dutch helmets lay on each grave.

Two German soldiers walked up. They took off their caps, stood silently for a minute, then walked away after one of the onlookers whispered to them.

A little man with a shovel was there too. He was not digging a new grave. He was taking home the body of his son.

ITALY GEARED TO JUMP INTO BATTLE

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decreed was hastily rushed through the senate last night, a full week ahead of schedule.

The measure, which can be invoked at a moment's notice, gives the government power to mobilize all citizens over the age of 14 and requisition the services of private capital, industry, labor groups and transportation systems.

Flames Fanned

It authorizes the government to regulate public consumption of all materials, limit or ban exports and imports, and set up machinery for distributing food and other necessities.

Complaints about the treatment of Italians in French Morocco were published in the Italian press, fanning the flames of dislike for the French and the British allies.

Persons speaking English in public places were subjected to unfriendly stares and in some cases insults by youthful Italians.

The three trans-Atlantic liners whose departures were postponed were the Rex, Augustus and Neptunia.

New dates for sailings were set, and officials said the postponements were merely a matter of routine, but the action was regarded in foreign circles as highly significant.

Saw No Planes

We kept straining our eyes for allied planes and saw none. Staff officers told us that German scouting planes located every enemy contingent. These scouts knew who was who in each approaching column.

They also knew where the bridges which had to be crossed were without trees offering shelter or where else they were especially vulnerable.

With this knowledge the German air force appeared so supreme that attack on the massed roads by the allies seemed inadvisable. But we wondered why at least no effort was made to drop bombs on strategic bridges or military highways.

Germans Puzzled

German officers pressed to be puzzled by a seeming lack of cooperation between the allied air force and the allied armies and by what they called aimless dropping of bombs at night on western German cities.

German officers assured me that they were keeping exact tabs on these bombings, all of which they claimed hit civilians and non-military objects.

STOCK MARKET RALLIES WHEN BUYERS ENTER

NEW YORK, May 25 (AP)—Despite confusing war news, Wall Street appeared in no mood to batter the stock market today and in the final hour leaders rallied fractions to 3 points.

Late buying in steels and aviation helped the speculative temper and tended to offset sluggishness in a few other departments. Transfers for the two hours were around 500,000 shares.

Although dispatches told of Prime Minister Churchill's warning that "the gravity of the situation depends hour by hour" and claims of substantial progress made by the Germans, financial quarters still felt the allies had a chance and refrained from dumping commitments unduly.

Forecasts of a brisk upswing in next week's steel mill operations provided some cheer for board rooms and apparently brought in purchasers for shares in this group.

The speed-up of the rearmament program by congress continued to keep aircraft in the limelight and these dipped forward with the hard metal division.

Prominent on the belated push were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, Glenn Martin, Lockheed, Anaconda, Kennecott, Du Pont, Allied Chemical, Phelps Dodge, N. Y. Central, Santa Fe, American Telephone and Sears Roebuck. Some of these backed away a bit at the last.

General Motors and Chrysler were off most of the day, but eventually picked up a following inclined to lag were Johnson-Manville, Dow Chemical, Union Carbide and American Can.

Bonds were a shade uneven but commodities pointed higher. The "free" pound sterling and French franc maintained a steady course.

CHICAGO, May 25 (AP-USA)—Wheat prices rose more than a cent a bushel as traders followed the rally in securities and gains of better than three cents in wheat quotations at Winnipeg.

While reports from the war front remained confusing some dealers regarded the outstanding strength at Winnipeg as a possible cue either to an encouraged allied situation or export business. There was no confirmation, however, of any fresh sales of Canadian wheat abroad.

Wheat closed 1-11/2 higher than yesterday, July 84 1/2-85c, September 84 1/2-85c, corn 1-1/2 higher, July 84 1/2-85c, September 84 1/2-85c, oats 1-1/2 higher.
