WAR REFUGEES FIND WAYS TO ENGLAND

The American Red Cross funds cabled to the British Red Cross are being used to aid great numbers of Dutch and Belgian refugees who are reaching England's shores, the local chapter has been informed.

The refugees in many instances arrived in small open boats after harrowing trips across the channel, the Red Cross was told.

The people of Greenland also have called upon the Red Cross. It was announced, but not for relief. The following wireless message was received from Maurice R. Reddy, Red Cross executive on board a coast guard cutter sent to survey needs on the northern island: "Greenlanders want no relief but now implore the Red Cross to get information concerning loved ones in Denmark. All communications with homeland cut off. One official's mother near death when last news from Denmark received and other families have worries equally serious."

The Red Cross will make inquiry through international headquarters at Geneva, officials said.
