LOCAL CREWS REPLACE LAST MANUAL PHONE

Installation of the last dial telephone replacing the old manual type was completed Wednesday morning and it was announced at the offices of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company that everything is in readiness for the "cut" at midnight June 1 which will give Klamath Falls a new dial telephone system.

The change-over, to be made sharply at 12 o'clock next Saturday night, will make Klamath Falls the fourth city in Oregon to adopt a dial system. Others already using the dial method are Portland, Salem and Ashland, and a change-over is planned at Medford in August.

Approximately 5000 telephones operated from the Klamath Falls offices will be affected by the change. Crews which started work last November 15 have just finished taking out the old type telephones and installing the new. Practically all rural areas in the vicinity and the city proper will be served by the new system.

A crew of 42 men are at work this week making a final check-up in preparation for the change.

When the new system is in operation the new Pacific Telephone and Telegraph offices at Eighth and Pine streets will become headquarters for the telephone service and all equipment at the old offices at 126 South Seventh will be permanently replaced.

The change will not bring about a marked reduction in the number of operators employed, it was pointed out by telephone company officials. About 24 operators will still be on hand to handle long-distance, informational and miscellaneous calls.

KLAMATH ARTIST EXHIBITS PAINTING AT ART MUSEUM

Included in the All-Oregon exhibition at the Portland Art museum, on display May 23 to June 30, is an oil painting "The Peninsula" by Virginia White Brown, 1335 Pacific Terrace, of this city.

All serious Oregon artists were invited to participate in this exhibit which includes 323

entries, but Mrs. Brown is believed to be the only participant from Klamath Falls.

The picture which is Mrs. Brown's most recent and one of many lovely ones done by this Klamath artist within the past several years, is a scene of the peninsula in the Modoc Lava Beds, with the desert coloring of autumn. Mrs. Brown has had the distinction of having a number of her paintings displayed at various outstanding exhibits in Portland.

GENERAL REDUCES GASOLINE PRICES

Marked reductions in the prices of gasoline sold in Mobilgas stations in this city as well as up and down the entire Pacific coast territory were announced by General Petroleum corporation in a large advertisement appearing today in this paper.
