

COUNTY CHIEFS FAVOR FEDERAL CONTRIBUTIONS

Action favorable to the movement to secure federal contributions in lieu of taxes for federally owned land has been taken by the National Association of County Officials, it was reported Monday by County Judge U. E. Reeder and members of the county court upon their return from a district meeting of the Association of Oregon Counties.

Judge Reeder said county courts from six counties, meeting Friday and Saturday at Burns, Ore., heard the reading of a resolution passed by the national association at its recent convention at Houston, Tex.

The resolution reads in part: "Be it resolved . . . that the federal government should by general law applicable throughout the United States provide for contributions to the counties in which said government holds lands in its proprietary capacity as distinguished from lands held for purely governmental purposes, such contributions to be in lieu of the taxes which such lands would pay if privately owned and taxable . . ."

Officials have estimated that the income to Klamath county, if the federal contributions are received, would be approximately \$120,000 annually.

The movement originated in Oregon last fall and a bill is now before congress.

SHASTA-CASCADE BUILDING OPENS AT 1940 FAIR

TREASURE ISLAND — Resplendent in new exterior decorations of more attractive colors and with an interior motif appropriate to the elaborate ceremonies of the day, the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland building opened promptly when the aerial cannonade announced the 1940 Golden Gate International exposition under way on Treasure Island Saturday.

Early crowds swarmed the building in which are the exhibits descriptive of the scenic, agricultural, industrial and recreational attractions of the wonderland region. During lunch hour the wonderland outdoor court, more attractive than last year, was thronged by picnic parties. Entertainment within the building at intervals during the afternoon drew heavy attendance from first day fair visitors, hundreds of whom registered with flattering comment and requests for specific information about the many attractions and resources of the six northern California and three southern Oregon counties represented.

Contributions Pour Into Red Cross War Relief Fund

SAN FRANCISCO, May 29 — Contributions to the Red Cross war relief fund today totaled \$2,700,000, it was announced by A. L. Schafer, Pacific area manager.

The Sun Oil company contributed \$10,000 and an anonymous gift of \$20,000 was received in Philadelphia.

Gives \$6000
In Boston, John Shepard III, president of the Yankee New England radio network, contributed \$6000 in the name of his company.

The Montgomery, Ala., Red Cross chapter last night mailed a check for its quota of \$10,000 to national headquarters following a whirlwind campaign in which the progress of donations was marked by moving a Red Cross ambulance borrowed from Maxwell field. The check was "issued" on a strip of muslin, six feet long and two feet wide.

Picnic Cancelled
The Sunday school class of the Grace Episcopal church, Medford, Mass., voted to cancel its annual picnic and give the money instead to the Red Cross war relief fund. Mary Virginia Williams, 7 years old, of Murray, Ky., wrote President Roosevelt a letter, enclosing her picture, and a dime. "Here is a dime I have been saving," she wrote. "I would like to help the children across the sea whose daddies have been killed in that awful war. I wish every little girl in our country would send a dime, then we would have a lot of dimes to send them."

In Irvington, N. J., a contribution of \$100 was made in the name of M. G. V. Schwaebischer.

Second Prince Of Kaiser's Family Killed In Battle

BERLIN, May 29 (AP)—The death of Prince Wilhelm of Prussia from a wound while fighting in Flanders was announced today. He was the oldest son of Former Crown Prince Friedrich Wilhelm and the second Hohenzollern victim of the European war.

The other member of the house of Hohenzollern to die was Prince Oscar, cousin of Prince Wilhelm. Oscar fell on the Polish front.

Wilhelm received a heavy abdominal wound in fighting in Flanders on May 23. He was hurried to a military hospital near Brussels where he died Sunday morning after being decorated with the Iron cross, first class.

Wilhelm was born July 4, 1906, in Marmor palace. He was married June 3, 1933, to Dorothea von Salviati, descendant of an Italian family.
