RAIN NECESSARY FOR GOOD CROPS IN WHEAT AREAS

PORTLAND, May 30 (AP)—Rain is necessary to continue good to excellent wheat conditions and assure a strong crop for harvest, the weather bureau reported today.

Conditions held favorable for haying. Some vetch is lodging. Pastures are adequate and livestock in good shape.

The strawberry crop is abundant and some cherries have reached the market. Other fruits are doing well, although there is a comparatively small set in northwest Oregon districts. Peach and apricot thinning is well advanced and nuts are setting satisfactorily.

New potatoes are on the market in warmer localities and planting of the main crop continues.

WASHINGTON, May 30 (AP)—Establishment of an area in Curry county, Oregon, to be known as the "Oregon Coast National Park," was proposed by Senator McNary (R-Ore.) in a measure introduced yesterday. Such a step would be contingent upon

FISHERMAN GETS 34-INCH BEAUTY

One of the largest fish to be taken from Lake Odell in recent years was brought in Tuesday by Bill Huber of Oakland, California, who, with Neldon Black, also of Oakland, has been spending part of his two weeks' vacation at the lake.

The fish, taken on a red head plug, measured 34 inches in length and weighed exactly 19 pounds, according to J. T. McCollum, who measured and weighed it. It possessed none of the identifying marks of the Dolly Varden, the Rainbow or the Mackinaw, but strongly resembled a Quinnet Salmon, and is the only specimen of that variety known to have been caught in Odell waters.
