

KLAMATH HOST TO TWO LABOR GROUPS SOON

Preparations are being made at the Klamath Falls Labor temple for two state labor conventions to be held in the middle of next month.

On June 15 and 16 there will be a meeting of the state building trades council in which about 85 delegates representing all building trade crafts of the state will congregate here. Headquarters for the convention will be the labor temple.

International representatives and all state representatives will meet here June 17 for the annual state convention of the State Federation of Labor. Meetings will be held at the Fremont school and convention headquarters will be the Willard hotel.

It was made known by Joe Willis, secretary of the building trades council and business agent for the laborers' organization, that the local central council will introduce a resolution urging contractors to be licensed, and another resolution vigorously opposing all WPA commercial sidewalk projects.

Local labor committees are now at work preparing the convention programs.

Annual Event

Annually, each June, all Mooseheart committees of the more than 800 chapters of the Women of the Moose located throughout the United States and Canada, sponsor their special program of the year for chapter development.

It is significant that Mooseheart committees should hold their program at this time of the year since June marks the month when commencement is held at Mooseheart, Ill., where there is located the famous "Child City" for dependent children of deceased members of the Loyal Order of Moose. The city was founded and built in 1913 by the Honorable James J. Davis U. S. senator of Pennsylvania.

Commencement

Mooseheart commencement not only focuses attention upon Mooseheart standards which offer the world a workable solution to child care and training problems, but it interprets these standards and offers concrete evidence and proof of their practical application in effective child care and training.

Mooseheart standards represent a model educational system, as well as home and community life, which are workable in every other school, home and community where applied. There are 28 states represented in this year's Mooseheart graduating class. Miss Lillian Sheets, from Baker, Ore., is one of the graduates.

Average Age

The average age of the gradu-

ate is 18 years and the average stay at Mooseheart is 11 years and 6 months. Each boy and girl has had an opportunity to earn a vocational diploma in addition to the accredited academic diploma, thus bearing out the conviction of the founder that every child is entitled to at least a high school education and a trade.

In addition, each graduate has had the advantage offered by the psychological laboratory for child research sponsored by the Women of the Moose. The fact is that more opportunities for development and growth are offered at Mooseheart than the average home is able to offer its children.

YOUTH SENTENCED ON ASSAULT CHARGE

Robert Hollingshead, 19, found guilty on a charge of assault and battery, was sentenced to a year in the county jail Wednesday by Circuit Court Judge Edward B. Ashurst.

Hollingshead was arraigned on charges growing out of an altercation between him and Mariano Cortez, a Mexican, in which Cortez received facial lacerations that necessitated hospital treatment. The fight allegedly occurred Saturday night at the Pelican hotel. Cortez is an employee of the Algoma Lumber company and a resident of Algoma.

INTEGRATION OF POWER PROPOSED

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 30 (UP)—Complete integration of public and private power facilities in the Pacific northwest for national defense purposes was proposed Tuesday by Bonneville Power Administrator Paul J. Raver.

Raver said in a note to Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes that completion of the interconnection of government plants on the Columbia river with all existing utilities in the area was necessary. It would add to expansion of existing industries including aircraft and engine manufacturing, shipbuilding, lumber-

ing and paper manufacture, he said.

Alloys

Raver also pointed to the possibilities of development of new industries in the area including manufacture of ferrochrome, manganese, tungsten, aluminum and magnesium alloys. He emphasized the importance of developing large war industries including munitions, war gases and chemicals for explosives, aircraft alloys and armor plate.

The administrator recommended acceleration of Bonneville interconnections with Tacoma and Seattle, Wash., which would stabilize the power supplies of all three plants, construction of a second line into Grays Harbor and the Cushman plant at Tacoma.

WAR UNCERTAINTY DELAYS BANK PLAN

PORTLAND, Ore., May 30—

The capital expansion recently proposed by the United States National Bank of Portland has been postponed until the condition of world affairs becomes more favorable, stated an announcement issued today by Paul S. Dick, president. "The unsettled state of affairs abroad," said Dick, "has had economic repercussions in this country which seem to justify deferring the offer of new securities until the situation is more favorable."

This decision of the bank is in line with action recently

taken by several large commercial concerns that had previously announced plans for capital enlargement.

NATIONAL PARKS REDUCE RATES

Many important rate reductions, particularly on so-called "nuisance items," together with improved and enlarged facilities are promised to visitors throughout the national park system during the 1940 season, according to Harold Wormser of Portland, director of the Oregon State Motor association.

"As a result of many complaints against rates in a number of park areas," Wormser said, "the superintendents' conference with park operators, held in Santa Fe last fall, decided to bring about wholesale rate reductions, including rates

for minimum priced cabin accommodations. Also the park service decided to abandon plans to charge visitors for special park fishing licenses, and further eliminated park road toll charges.

YOUTH GETS FIVE YEARS ON FORGERY COUNT

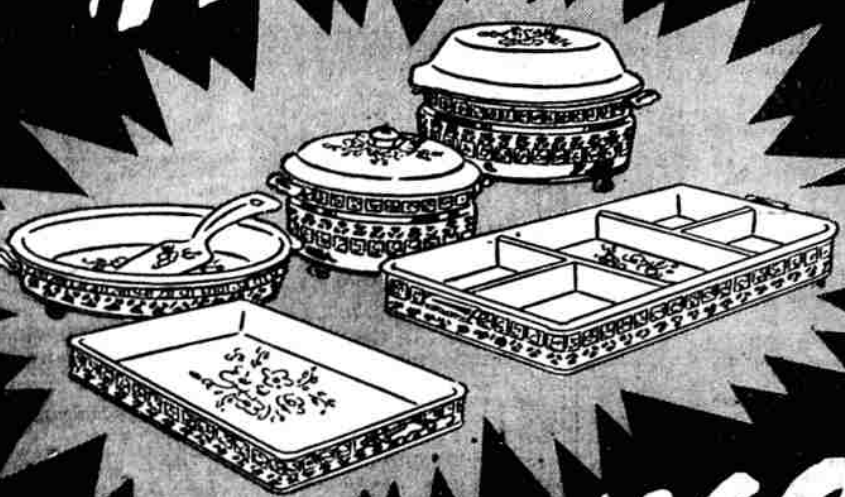

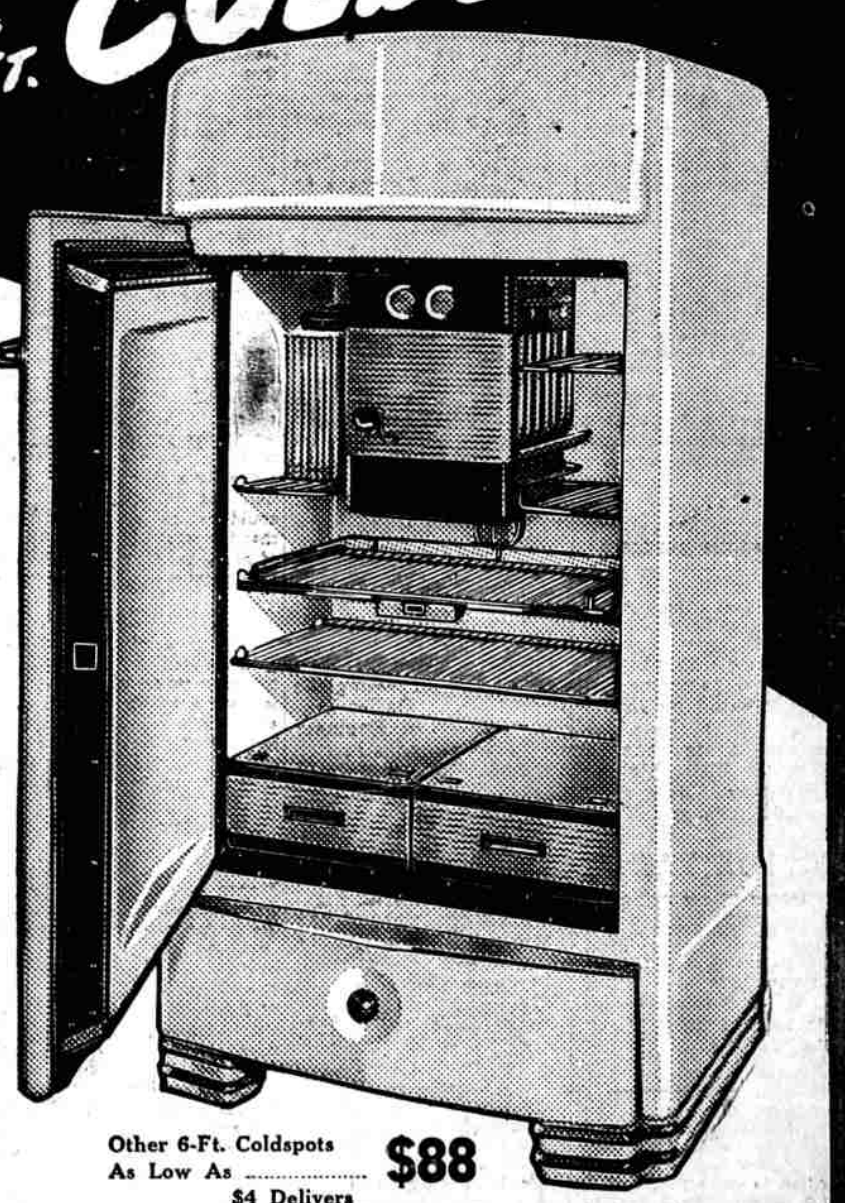
