SILVER LAKE—Funeral services for D. H. Linebaugh, Lake county resident for the last 33 years, were held at Cottage Grove Saturday. He was born in Jackson county October 21, 1866 and was married to Miss Mary Shields of Eugene, in 1887. They came to Lake county in 1907 and spent one year at Paisley. The next year they moved to Silver Lake where he was foreman of the ZC ranch for 16 years. In 1924 he resigned this position to live on his own ranch. Death occurred at Astoria after an illness of several weeks.

ASHLAND, May 30 (Special)

An invitation to dramatic inclined young persons from Grants Pass and vicinity to participate in this season's Shakespearean productions here this summer, has been extended by Director William David Cottrell.

Casting for major and supporting roles will be started the week of June 3 in the gymnasium of the Southern Oregon College of Education here and rehearsal scheduled will go in effect immediately upon completion of the preliminary trials.

An opportunity to gain valuable summer stock theatrical experience is made available and Director Cottrell requested all persons interested to contact him here as soon as possible. No roles have been awarded as yet and several vacancies exist in characterizations where original players have been unable to return.

This year's plays will be streamlined and modernized to a considerable extent. So-called "heavy drama" has been eliminated and emphasis has been placed on lighter, comedy-type work.

The festival itself will be held in the civic Elizabethan theatre here, between August 9 and August 17.

The second child, also born at Klamath Valley, was presented

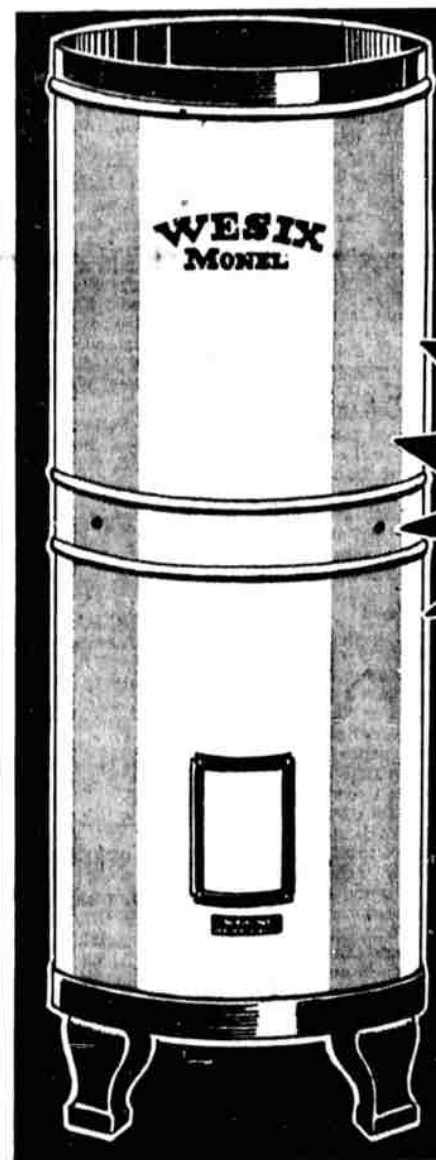

Flying squirrels do not fly. The flap of skin connecting the fore and hind limbs enables them only to glide.

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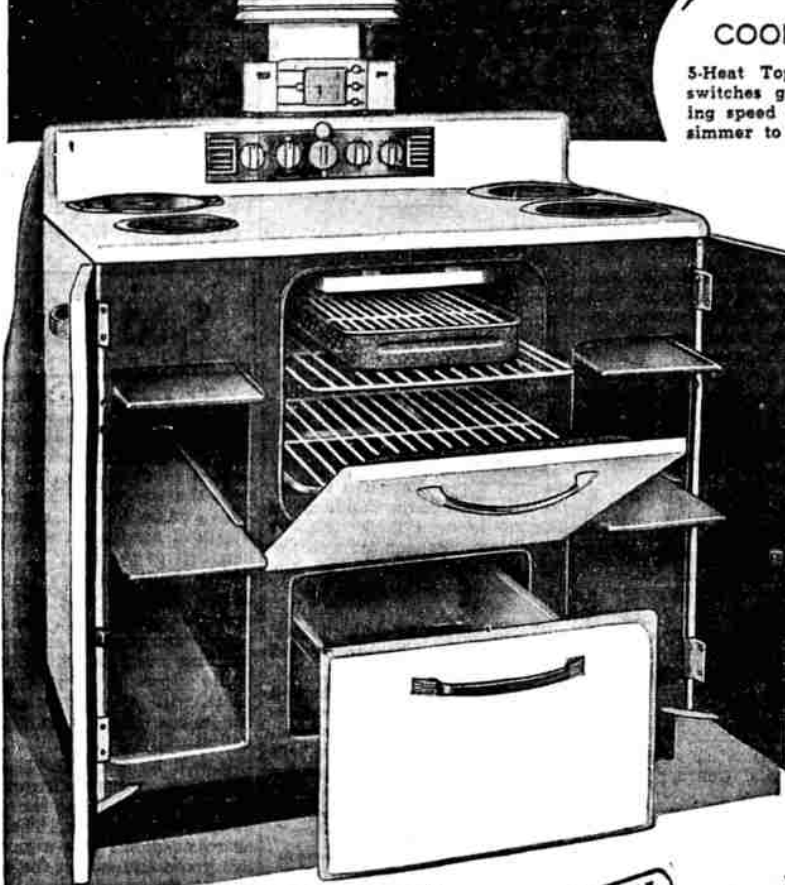
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
