SPORTSMEN DEBATE OREGON GAME LAW

At their meeting Wednesday night members of the Klamath Sportsmen's association held a debate on the pros and cons of an initiative petition sponsored by the Wild Life Federation to change the structure of the Oregon state game commission.

The initiative, it was pointed out at the meeting, would change the name of the Oregon state game commission to the Oregon Wildlife commission. Under the change all law enforcement powers on game and fish violations would be taken from the state police and 40 men, to be known as game protectors, would be hired as the law enforcement body of the new commission.

It was pointed out by Captain Charles McClees of the state police in charge of fish and game enforcement that under the old game warden or game protector system, from August 1, 1929, to July 31, 1939, the game commission spent \$152,526.94 for law enforcement, with 707 arrests, at a cost of \$213.73 per case. From August 1, 1939, to July 31, 1931, law enforcement cost the commission \$156,431.83, with 653 arrests, or a cost of \$239.15 per case.

Under the state police for the first year of its operation, game enforcement cost from August 1, 1931, to July 31, 1932, \$137,489.00, with 1113 arrests, or \$123.53 per case. From January 1, 1939, to January 1, 1940, under the state police the cost of the game commission was \$122,370.19, with 1533 arrests, or a cost of \$79.82 per case.

It was also pointed out by Captain McClees that the state police can be shifted to accommodate opening and closing seasons in various areas of Oregon. F. B. Wire, state game supervisor, gave an interesting talk on fish allocation and liberation. The supervisor pointed out that fish will be planted in terms of the amount that the lake or stream will support as to food conditions, and not as to various counties. Wire also brought pictures for the entertainment, which were enjoyed by all.

Outside visitors were Austin Smith, president, Lakeview Sportsman association; O. C. Gibbs, secretary, Henry Cassidy, vice president, W. O. Harriman, superintendent, Fremont national forest; Carl Fetsch, Lakeview business man and sportsman.

GIRL TURNS DOWN \$25,000 TO PICK QWN HUSBAND

ELIZABETH, N. J., May 31 (AP)—Virginia Cocalis is turning down a \$25,000 bequest to marry the man she loves.

The daughter of a Greek immigrant who developed a chain of movie theatres in New York, New Jersey and Connecticut, she said she had married George McMillan of Knoxville, Tenn., in New York.

Soteros D. Cocalis, who died on April 22, 1939, set forth in his will that Virginia would receive \$25,000 if she married a person born in the Greek orthodox faith and a member of the church at the time of his marriage. That was the sole mention of the daughter, a Wellesley graduate in the class of 1937.
