## Fishin's Fun

The Merry-Go-Round at DIAMOND LAKE is still running at top speed. People who fish there and do not get fish are news rather than those who catch fish. Trolling with flashers is the number one pastime. Wobblers are accounting for a great many limits and are popular because of the lack of pull on the line. Trout-oreos in Red-Head and Rainbow finish are also good. All boats are reserved for this week-end. Fly fishing, both from shore and boat, is good. Limits from 12 to 20 inches are common. Bucktail flies work best. CRESCENT LAKE, Bend reports, is producing some extra large fish, the kind that bust your tackle. Eight and one-half pound rainbow are common. Doc Sheltons with worms work best. Fly fishing along shore is good in late afternoon.

Fly fishing on the ROGUE RIVER for trout has improved 100 per cent lately. The fish, however, are small in size. The NORTH FORK of the ROGUE has reported good fly fishing and most of the small streams leading into the NORTH FORK and the main Rogue are now in good shape for fly fishing.

GOLD LAKE fishing should be fair. Quite a few are figuring on making this trip. The fishing here is usually very good at this time of the year.

FOUR MILE is still a little early or the fishing is really off. Few fish are reported. FISH LAKE is still pretty much of a gamble, but if you hit the jackpot you will have a limit in short order.

UPPER KLAMATH LAKE at most all points produced some nice fish. Most were caught trolling wobblers.

Trolling on PAULINA LAKE has been good and fly fishermen are running a temperature. Both the browns and rainbow are rising to flies and run nice size.

EAST LAKE is still best on bait with some being caught on wobblers. Worms fished on the bottom for those foxy eastern brook work best.

DESCHUTES RIVER above Bend reports very good fishing for both browns and rainbow on your favorite fly. Any pattern seems to work.

In METOLIS RIVER some nice limits have been caught by local anglers on flies. The time of day doesn't seem to effect their biting. Blue upright seem to work best.

NORTH FORK OF THE SPRAGUE hasn't opened up its peak, but it is getting better. Cluster bugs will probably work this weekend.

20-MILE CREEK out of Lakeview, has reported some nice fish caught on worms and eggs. THE CHEWAUCAN is still too high for good fishing. However, a few are being caught and any day now it should take a turn and get hot.

The major cause of fire in the woods is man. All who use the woods for camping pleasures should be careful, putting it mildly. Be sure it's out when you throw it away or leave it and 50 per cent of all fires will be eliminated.

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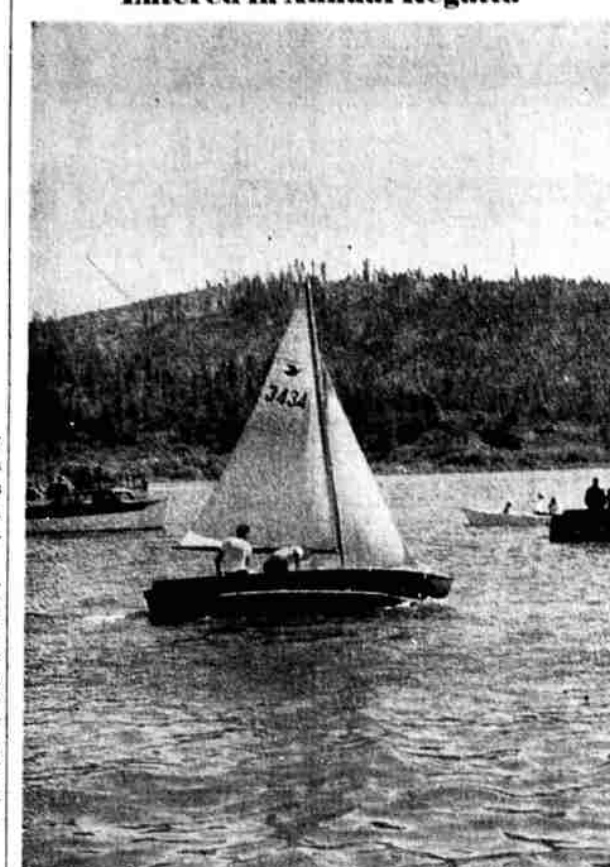
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## Entered in Annual Regatta

Seattle's seat at the head of the Pacific Coast Baseball league parade was a bit more secure Saturday in further proof that while base hits help a lot in the game, the payoff is made strictly on the basis of runs across the plate.

The Hollywood Stars garnered 12 hits while the Rainiers were collecting only 9 in their game Friday night, but Seattle won the contest, 6-2.

The Stars loaded the bases five times in four innings, but failure to hit at the critical moments resulted in 18 players being stranded on the pads. John Tate, Seattle rightlander, twice fanned a batter for the third out when the bases were full.

Manager Bill Sweeney and Third Sacker Bob Kahle tallied for the Stars in the ninth on a single by Pinch Hitter Cliff Dapper. Four Rainiers galloped home in the seventh, thanks to a walk, four hits and Catcher Ed Kearse's double.

The league's second place Oakland Oaks punched the cellar-dwelling Portland Beavers groggy with 23 hits and an 18-2 victory. Leaders of the Oakland attack on three Portland pitchers were Pitcher Jack Salvson, Manager Johnny Vergez and First Baseman Cecil Dunn with a homer each, Dunn's bringing in two other runs.

Los Angeles overcame San Diego's 5-4 lead in the seventh inning with a four-run rally which gave the Angels the game, 8-5.

Sacramento nosed out San Francisco, 4-3, with Pitcher George Munger figuring prominently in the triumph.

## LOU FINNEY AND DANNING LEAD BATTING

NEW YORK, June 2 (P)—Add Outfielder Lou Finney to the list of reasons Boston's Red Sox are at the head of the American league parade.

Lou, just another one of the players Tom Yawkey's "cabbage" picked up from the athletes, is the new pace-setter of the junior circuit batters, picking up one point during the last week to sport a neat 396 mark for the season to date. He's one of three clouters the Sox have in the top ten.

At the same time Harry the Hoss Danning, tireless catcher of the New York Giants went farther than ever ahead of the National league batters. The Hoss dropped from 394 to 382 for the season, but his loss was nothing like those of his nearest rivals of a week ago. Dixie Walker, the ex-American leaguer, now with Brooklyn, has pulled up from fifth to second place with 354.

Finney walloped to a 400 batting pace for the week collecting ten hits in 25 trips to the plate. Frankie Hayes, Athletics' catcher and leader the previous week, lost 25 points, dropped to 392 and sank to third place. Rip Radcliff of the Browns remained second, but lost 14 points. Only newcomer to show in the junior circuit's top ten was Lou Bourdieu, Cleveland's infield rookie, who moved into tenth place with 327.

Back of Danning, there was a general shakeup among the National league pacemakers. Walker climbed to second while Ernie Lombardi dropped from the runner-up spot to fourth, getting only five hits in 24 chances during the seven day span. Hank Leiber of the Cubs bunched up from seventh to third, collecting 12 hits in 32 chances and boosting his average ten points to 344. Newcomers in the top ten were a couple of Boston Bees, Chet Ross and Eddie Miller. The former took over fifth place with 339 and Miller marched into tenth with 318.
