The French reported last night that they had liquidated the last German bridgehead on the south bank of the river in the vicinity of Abbeville.

The first German attacks were launched yesterday noon and were continued until nightfall without letup. At dawn today the Germans returned again to the assault.

A war ministry spokesman said the battle still was continuing.

LONDON, June 1—General Lord Gort, commander of the British expeditionary force which is fighting its way out of Flanders, came home today to the acclaim of his king while his soldiers estimated that all but one war-battered division of the original 175,000 men in his army have been removed from the Nazi pocket.

Britain's divisions normally number about 15,000 men each, but the claim that one division still was in Flanders recognized that it likely is not intact.

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would take over operation of the Lamm railroad connecting with the Southern Pacific at Chin-challo. Pelican Bay receives part of its log supply over the railroad and through such an arrangement this supply could be continued.

Although delivery of these logs was cut off by the labor trouble Friday, there was no probability of a log shortage at Pelican Bay. Mortenson said there was a large supply of logs in the pond and that more could be obtained at logging operations on private lands.

After a consultation with Fenton, Mortenson said the union was apparently not opposed to use of the Lamm railroad by the Pelican Bay company.

In evidence Saturday was a difference of opinion between the company and the union regarding an incident at the camp on May 30, which followed the serving of a letter containing the demands upon Superintendent Charles W. King of the logging camp.

The company claims that the men at that time voluntarily walked off the job, on the afternoon of May 30 and prior to 7 a. m. May 31, the time set by the union for an answer to its demands. The union, on the other hand, claims that the men received an order to quit work on May 30, and that this constituted a lock-out. The company says the cease-work order was immediately countermanded and the men told to go back to work.

Company officials, they said, were under a misapprehension, following the receipt of the demands, that the men had already called a strike, and were simply ordering their equipment out of the woods. As soon as the misunderstanding was discovered, the order was countermanded and operations were resumed without loss of time or pay to the men. The company spokesmen said the men left the job of their own accord later that afternoon.

The version of the union men on the Thursday incident was that first fallers were told to cease work, and later the entire operation was ordered shut down. Thereafter, they asserted, some of the men were told to return to work, but when they saw other employees in camp who had not been ordered back on the job, they stayed off to protect these employees.

L. H. Fenton, international board member of the IWA, asserted that the cease-work order Thursday constituted an unfair labor practice and said the union is preparing to file charges with the national labor relations board against the Lamm Lumber company. Fenton stated the cease-work order was given to fallers, loading jammers, truck drivers, and all but a few of the employees.

The IWA official said the union was making plans to set up its own kitchen at the camp. W. E. Lamm, head of the company, stated the cookhouse would be operated and the men taken care of as usual.

Lamm stated further that over a long period of time he had received many requests from the union, and in each instance had considered them carefully. He said that in April, he received 12 demands, and granted 11 of them, and on other occasions had received requests from employees and had granted many of them, although there is no contract in existence between the IWA and the company.

Fenton claims the union represents 95 per cent of Lamm's woods employees.

This is a letter sent to the union committee by the company through the president, W. E. Lamm, late Friday:

"Gentlemen: Your letter dated May 29, which was not mailed until May 30, and fortunately reached the hand of Mr. King, our superintendent, on that day and which was immediately forwarded to us, giving us until today, the 31st, to answer certain demands of your committee, is before us for answer.

"Although the time mentioned in your letter was unreasonably short, yesterday, on May 30th, the day before the time given us for an answer, you or some of your number, without warning and without word to us, induced our employees to quit work, and our operations had to cease because of your walkout, notwithstanding the company has always been willing to negotiate in these matters. The operation is still down, notwithstanding the company is ready and willing to operate.

"As you have not shown us the courtesy of waiting for our answer within the time you expressly stated in your letter, we feel you have certainly not treated us fairly in this matter. You refer to your committee as the 'Union Negotiating Committee,' but we have never had an experience like this where negotiators have induced our employees to quit work, before the company's time—arbitrarily fixed by the negotiators within which an answer was to have been made—had expired.

"You have arbitrarily and without cause ceased to work. Under these circumstances there seems to be nothing left for us to do except to await the returning to work of the employees, which we sincerely hope they will do, and which we will give them a reasonable time to do, or leave the camp shut down indefinitely, or employ other men who will work and who will deal fairly with the company in discussing and negotiating with us.

Dwight Gilchrist, life saving chairman, reported on the water safety instructor's course held the week of May 13 at Butler's Natatorium. He stated 12 men and women took the instruction from Ben Carpenter, national representative. Five people, two women and three men passed the examination and will be water safety instructors. Due to the inability to secure a sponsor, the Red Cross swim week will not be held this year.

Mrs. Dean Miller, nursing representative, reported two new nurses had enrolled in the Red Cross nursing service. They are June Solee and Margaret Wagoner.

The \$4000 quota for the war relief fund was accepted and the board felt they would not put on a definite drive or house to house canvass, but would continue with the present plan of asking for voluntary donations for at least one week.

Leslie Rogers, treasurer, reported \$1432 had been raised to date. Fifteen per cent of this money raised will be kept in the local chapter to buy material to make garments to send to the war refugees.

A new quota of garments was accepted by the local chapter. This quota consists of 10 men's sweaters, 10 women's black shawls, 20 children's sweaters, 10 women's dresses, 20 girls' dresses and 20 layettes. The National Red Cross has asked for other garments, such as hospital garments, children's stockings, boys' shirts and suits. All of the yarn used in making these garments will be furnished by the American Red Cross, to be purchased from the funds collected in the war relief campaign.

U. S. LAUNCHES NEW BATTLESHIP
