ACTION NEAR ON TULELAKE WATER PLANS

TULELAKE — Preliminary details of the proposed installation of water and sewer systems are gradually being ironed out and with the arrival of part of the plans and specifications from Edward K. Hussey, Oakland engineer, gained momentum this week, with the city council in session both Monday and Tuesday nights. Bonds which will finance the dual project will be advertised in the near future and the council hopes to turn over dirt on the long awaited civic improvement program before the end of the summer.

An ordinance was introduced Monday night for reduction of the license fee on potato sorters from \$24 to \$10 per year and A. A. Rodenberger, street commissioner was instructed to purchase stop signs to be placed at B and C streets on Main.

Arthur O'Conner, Yreka engineer who surveyed the town for sidewalk levels has submitted records to be used by the city. Charles Lederer, city attorney, announced that for the next few months an assistant from his office will meet with the council at each session to speed up work on the city's work program.

Al Porter and Jack Chapman, representing the 20-30 club asked help from the city in purchase of flood lights from the Klamath Falls chapter of the 20-30 to be installed at the elementary school building for night softball and football. Cost of the equipment would total about \$400. No action was taken.

B. E. Hayden, superintendent of the Klamath reclamation project has announced that the 69 lots taken into the incorporate area of the city the past year will not be sold, probably until late in the summer. The land parcels must first be appraised, the appraisals sent to Washington and approved before the land can be offered for sale.
