NEW MOULDING PLANT OPENS IN LAKEVIEW

LAKEVIEW — Lakeview's newest remanufacturing industry began operation here this week when the Oregon Moulding company, Inc., began production under the management of Mr. Jack Dahlen with his crew of 15 men. A special moulding machine designed by Mr. Dahlen is being used in the plant. It is expected that with this piece of machinery moulding can be cut at least one-third faster.

The first production will consist of a carload of rails for venetian blinds contracted for by the R. L. Smith Lumber company of Kansas City.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"Ancient and Modern Necromancy, Alas Mesmerism and Hypnotism, Denounced" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, June 2.

The Golden Text was, "Sing unto the Lord, praise ye the Lord: for he hath delivered the soul of the poor from the hand of evildoers" (Jer. 20:13).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Let no man deceive you with vain words: for because of these things cometh the wrath of God upon the children of disobedience" (Eph. 5:6).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Human will-power is not Science. Human will belongs to the so-called material senses, and its use is to be condemned. . . Human will-power may infringe the rights of man. It produces evil continually, and is not a factor in the realism of being" (p. 144).

Alamo, Kut el Mara Cited As Calais Garrison Holds

LONDON, June 3 (UP)—To the heroes roll of Alcazar, of Kut El Amara, of Liege and of Alamo add tonight a new name—Calais.

There in the weather-stained tourist port beside the English channel, in the moated citadel of the city that in peace-time is the French end of the Dover-Calais shuttle—a band of allied troops was believed still to be fighting. There was no positive word that the garrison had not been wiped out in the fierce fighting known to be raging but it was believed here to be still resisting.

Marine Assembly

Only today was the existence of this garrison, a hurried assembly of French and British infantry and marines, made known. In a rectangle 300 yards by 400 yards this force was reported standing fast, an allied outpost in a sea of German occupation.

The assignment of the garrison is simple. To hold out as long as men live to fire rifles and man the machine-guns. So long as the garrison survives Calais can not be used by the Germans as the spearhead of attacks on England.

The size of the garrison has not been revealed here and some military sources suggested that an attempt might be made to withdraw the survivors as soon as the evacuation of allied troops from Flanders has been completed.

Only Contact

Only contact with the force is by means of the royal air force which has dropped water, food and munitions by air to the small band. All around them the city of Calais was said to be burning, the smoke hanging in a heavy pall over the citadel.

German infantry in the streets, aided by mechanized units and artillery placed on nearby sand dunes, was exert-

ing every pressure against the allied troops.

RAF men back from Calais said the smoke from burning buildings was so heavy it was difficult to locate objectives. One plane was lost and several were hit by fierce German anti-aircraft fire.

Water Dropped

"As far as I could judge," one RAF officer said, "I passed right over the target and dropped water to the citadel. I immediately turned at a 180-degree angle and came back over the channel. One of our aircraft was seen to dive into the ground after the pilot had dropped water. I got off lightly, having only two tracer bullets in my tail. The chaps following had a far worse time. As I looked back I could see tracers flying in every direction."

The parallel to Calais most frequently drawn here was to the siege of Kut El Amara dur-

ing the World war when a British garrison was cut off during the Mesopotamian campaign but held out for four months with supplies dropped by airplane until forced to surrender after suffering 24,000 casualties out of a total of 33,000.

ARMY SEEKS OLD OREGON BRIDGES AS TARGETS

SALEM, Ore., June 3 (UP)—The United States army Saturday sought use of abandoned railroads and obsolete bridges in Oregon for air bombing targets.

Army officials communicated with C. B. McCullough, assistant state highway engineer, who said he believed the war department was making a similar survey in other states but contemplated no immediate use of the proposed targets.

McCullough informed the army officers he knew of no bridges under highway department control available for such a purpose, but there were several abandoned railroads that might be used.

McCullough mentioned a railroad in the Madras area and several logging lines in northwestern Oregon.

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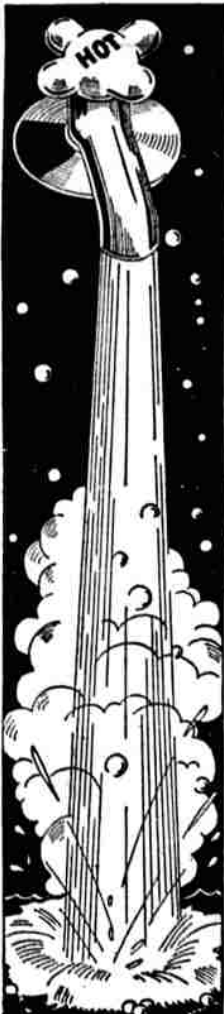
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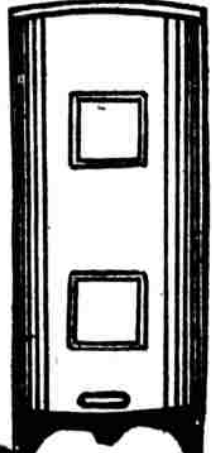
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
