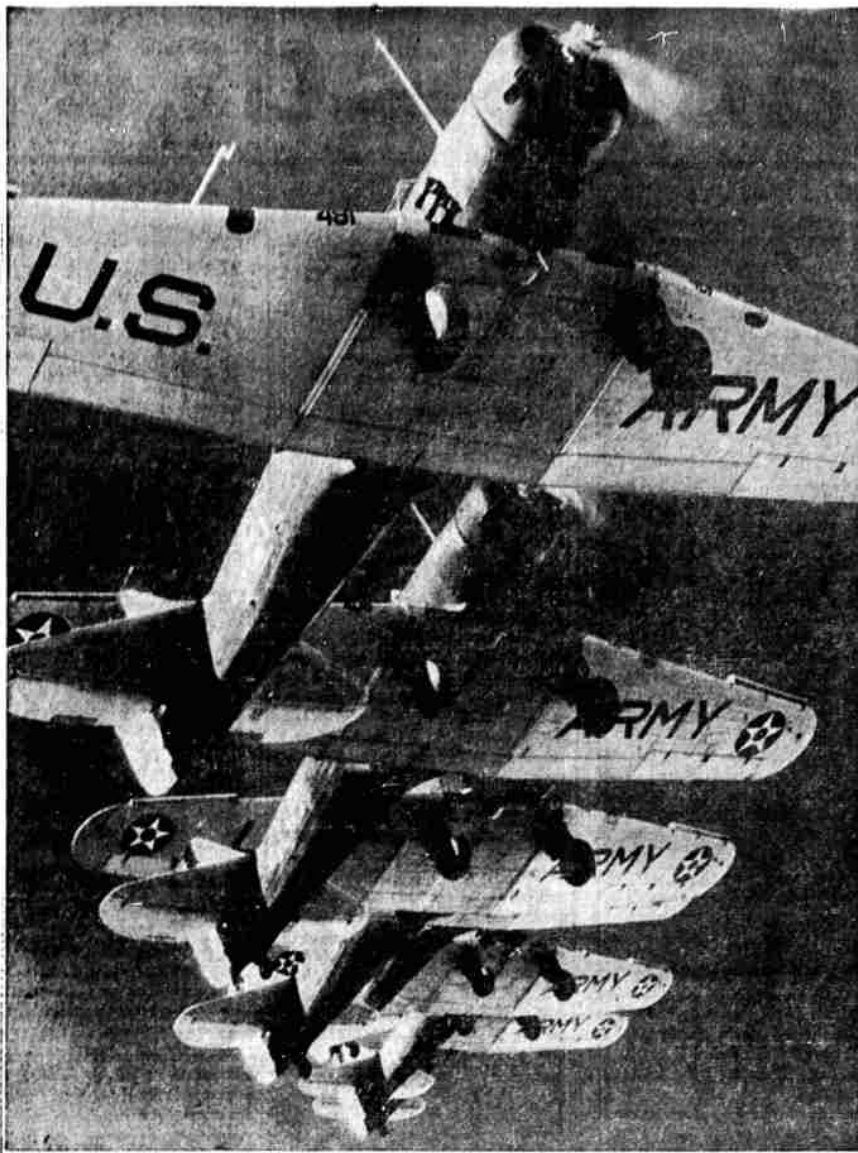

Wings are Sprouting for Uncle Sam's Fledglings



High over the "West Point of the air" at Randolph field, Texas, flying cadets roar along in wing tip to wing tip formation, part of their flight training that transforms them into full fledged military pilots of the army air corps. Congress has authorized 5500 planes by 1941, and to fly these modern day craft, classes of 400 flying cadets start flight training every six weeks. Formation flying such as seen above is just part of the exacting course of instruction. Flying cadets are also proficient in aerial acrobatics, night flying, navigation and instrument flying before receiving the coveted pair of wings, emblem of a military pilot.

Hawaii Resident Claims Japs Seeking Way to Control Area

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—Kilsoo K. Haan of Honolulu told a congressional committee yesterday that the Japanese government was endeavoring to obtain political control over the Hawaiian islands, with a view to eventual seizure of the American territory.

Haan, an American citizen of Korean origin, testified briefly before the house immigration committee. His testimony was cut short by a decision of the committee to hear the remainder of it later in a closed session.

The witness declared that Japanese propaganda activity directed at political control was being carried on in the islands by the Institute for the Education of Overseas Japanese and central board of Overseas associations, both of which he declared had headquarters in Japan.

He told newsmen, after he left the committee, that he appeared to ask suspension of civil service laws as regards civilian employees of army and navy reservations in the islands, so that officials might discharge persons of dual Japanese-American citizenship.

"There are several hundred persons of dual citizenship on these reservations and in view of Japan's plans they are dan-

COPCO INSTALLING PIPE IN SUBURBS

Installation of 1000 feet of four-inch pipeline on Summers lane is underway, it was made known at the offices of the California Oregon Power company. The new pipeline is going in along the frontage of the Will Humphrey sub-division and the Villa St. Clair.

An electrical extension in the Hildebrand district has just been completed, it was announced at the Copco offices. It consists of 4.6 miles of distribution circuit, strung on the present highline transmission poles, and will serve the Walker-Hovey timber operations in that area. Eight ranches and 20 houses occupied by Walker-Hovey employees will be served by the new line.

Oscar Brennenman, chief mechanic, is in charge of a Copco crew at the east side hydro-electric plant repairing the blades on the plant's verticle-type water-wheel. The crew is welding material on the blades to replace metal worn away by action of the water and a vacuum which is created at the trailing edge of the blades.

Along with the midge investigation work, Glover will make surveys of all of the fishing waters in Klamath county. Investigation work will begin on June 10.
