WONDERLAND SALES SHOW INCREASE

The total retail sales of the six California Wonderland counties showed a gain of \$2,888,300 in 1939 over those of the same counties in 1938 according to the figures of the board of equalization.

Every one of the six counties made a good gain as shown by the following figures of sales subject to the retail sales tax. (The county is listed first, followed by the county seat, the 1938 figure, 1939 figure, and the gain.)

Trinity, Weaverville, \$828,900, \$917,800, \$88,900; Modoc, Alturas, \$1,861,600, \$2,056,800, \$195,200; Lassen, Susanville, \$4,168,800, \$4,618,000, \$449,200; Tehama, Red Bluff, \$4,660,300, \$5,162,500, \$502,200; Shasta, Redding, \$6,661,200, \$7,402,200, \$741,000; Siskiyou, Yreka, \$9,666,800, \$9,588,400, \$82,400.

Totals show \$26,867,400 for 1938, \$29,755,700 for 1939 for a gain of \$2,888,300.

This gain is all the more interesting as indicating the development of these counties when compared to the six counties just south of the Wonderland where the counties of Butte, Glenn, Colusa, Yuba, Sutter and Placer showed a loss of \$1,675,900 during the same period.

Aside from the healthy development going on in the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland counties, they have the added income from rapidly growing tourist travel, which was largely responsible for the fine increase in retail sales.

Two companies of national guardsmen from the Klamath Falls garrison will entrain June 10 at the Southern Pacific depot for Camp Clatsop, where they will participate in summer training.

ASHLANDERS DRILL FOR DRY ICE GAS

ASHLAND, Ore., June 5 — The city of Ashland is drilling for natural carbon dioxide on its Lithia springs property in a quantity sufficient to warrant establishment of a dry ice factory. At a depth of 250 feet, drillers struck a gas supply that would

be ample for a daily production of five tons of dry ice but they intend to reach the bottom of the sandstone formation before a final estimate of the capacity is made.

The gas from the partly-completed hole rises into the air to a height of 10 feet and lithia water bubbles out in a column three feet high, drillers said.
