FROST NIPS BASIN CROPS WEDNESDAY

Mercury in Klamath thermometers skidded to 31 degrees, just one degree below freezing, during early morning hours Wednesday and nipped potatoes and garden crops as it touched virtually all points in the basin area.

Potato growers in the Mt. Laki district, where a minimum of 31 degrees was reported, said the crops were badly nipped but no serious damage was expected. Out in the Shasta way area farmers rose early Wednesday morning to kick the ice

off buckets and look over the grain and garden plots. Potatoes seemed most heavily affected, although early beans and cucumbers were considerably withered.

Some gardens suffered in Klamath Falls, although the US weather bureau said the minimum temperature in the city was 38 degrees.

Ranchers in the Tulelake district reported a minimum of 31 degrees as did other sections of the area. No damage was reported to the US bureau of reclamation.

Freezing temperatures nipped all of Oregon according to statewide reports. Bend's minimum dropped to 26 degrees, lowest reading reported to the government bureau. Fair but clouding weather was forecast for north-west portions of the state Wednesday night and Thursday with higher temperatures in the interior.

MEASLES DECREASE IN KLAMATH

Measles fell off sharply in Klamath county during the past week, according to the state health department for the seven-day period ending June 1. New cases in the state declined from about 500 to 345, including Douglas, 14; Jackson, 52; Josephine, 34; Klamath, 11; Lane, 34; Multnomah, 13; Portland, 39; Marion, 47. One case of tick fever was reported in Baker county.
