

MORSE TELLS LABOR TO BE 'GOOD PATRIOT'

ASTORIA, Ore., June 6 (AP)—Dean Wayne L. Morse, Pacific coast waterfront arbiter, told the maritime federation of the Pacific convention Tuesday that labor could be a good patriot without surrendering its legitimate rights.

He warned the marine workers' delegates, however, that there were forces which could destroy labor's "hard won rights" under the guise of "national emergency."

To combat them he advised labor to use the weapon of strike sparingly and obey the laws and the constitution assiduously, even when it hurt.

Obeys Law

"If congress passes an act deporting Harry Bridges (west coast longshore and CIO leader), there is nothing to do but obey it," he said. "The legal institutions must be preserved."

Labor's strength, he asserted, lies in wise use of the implements in its hands. Public favor will be won through recourse to peaceful methods of settling disputes and a recourse to strike only as the final expedient.

"There will be circumstances justifying strikes," he continued. "The application of economic force may be necessary to shock the public into a realization of true conditions. But wise labor will exhaust every peaceful method first."

War Threat

He counseled labor to hitch up its belt and face the threat of war. "If this nation goes to war—and it may within 12 months—union leaders and union men must give loyal, patriotic service as in the past," but he also said that labor could continue to fight for its own fair ends while fighting the nation's battles.

He declared that labor gains as embodied in the national labor relations and wage hour acts should be protected from those who would "capitalize on a jittery public" and who would overthrow them in the name of patriotism.

Commenting on suggestions that communists and aliens be barred from employment in interstate commerce, Morse said these elements "may have to get used to restricted civil liberties unless they conduct themselves in conformance with the American system."

ESKIMOS DONATE TO RED CROSS

The Eskimo village of Gambell on the northwest shore of St. Lawrence island, only a few miles from the Siberian mainland, has donated \$60.50 to the American Red Cross War Relief fund, it was announced from the Pacific branch headquarters.

The Eskimo contribution was made from the village's arts and crafts fund collected from the sale of ivory carvings. With the exception of Little Diomed, St. Lawrence island is nearer Siberia than any other part of Alaska.

Vandalism at Moore Park Brings Offer of \$25 Reward

Vandalism at Mills park was brought to the attention of the city park board in session Tuesday afternoon, and the board has posted a \$25 reward for the arrest and conviction of persons who have damaged city property in that district.

E. E. Spencer, park caretaker, advised board members he had replaced sprinkler heads at Mills lawn at the rate of "about \$4 a week," and added benches had been removed, limbs of trees broken by the culprits, and the tennis nets cut and mutilated. It is impossible to leave the nets up at the present time, Spencer stated. The caretaker told the

board he did not think it was young children, but older boys and young men who were doing the damage.

If such vandalism continues, the board announced, the city would not keep up the park.

Mrs. Cyril V. Cook was granted the concession at Moore park and will occupy the new building as soon as it is completed.

The city engineer was given power to purchase a second-hand dump truck, cost not to exceed \$300.

M. E. Cornett of the Richfield Oil company was thanked by members of the board for the donation of wild flower seed to be used at Moore park.

"Gag" Put On Radio Amateurs

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—The federal communications commission today prohibited amateur radio communication by stations in this country with foreign stations.

A formal announcement of the action did not say why it was taken but a spokesman declared that "undoubtedly" it was due to the European war.

There are approximately 55,000 amateurs licensed by the commission.

The prohibition, which became effective immediately, does not apply to amateur communications between licensed amateur stations in the continental United States and its territories and possessions.
