

### CANOEES, YACHTS USED IN RETREAT

LONDON, June 6 (AP) — Incidents of the fleet of yachts, tugs, river barges, motor launches and even two canoes that was hurriedly manned by volunteers to aid in the withdrawal of allied troops from Dunkerque were related Wednesday by the admiralty officer who organized the "armada."

He said the volunteers included six girl members of a yacht club, one of whom assumed a brusque masculine voice on the telephone and became angry when her vocal disguise was penetrated.

The same girl telephoned later when the officer was out and told his assistant all arrangements had been made for her to go. The officer said he believes she "probably sneaked through" to the French coast.

Anything crossed "Anything that could propel itself or be towed" was allowed to cross the channel, the officer said, and two canoeists with outboard motors insisted they at least might be able to bring off a man each.

The volunteer crews included active and retired naval officers, army officers on sick leave and merchant seamen who slipped away from their ships to make the trip.

There were volunteers with navigational or engineering knowledge, and some with neither kind. Volunteer skippers of many craft reached Dunkerque by using the follow-the-leader system.

The officer said that presently there was no way of knowing the extent of the casualties to the boats and their crews. Losses will be ascertained only when the boats shall have been reassembled and the list of volunteers checked.

### FIRST CITY IN WASHINGTON GROWING AGAIN

STELLACOOM, June 6 (AP) — Stellacoom, Washington's first incorporated city and its first port is growing again — growing so much that it has now passed the population mark it set in 1858.

Census figures released Wednesday show Stellacoom has a 1940 population of 829, a gain of 105 persons since 1930.

Mayor W. E. Morris revealed the new figure "surpasses by about 29 persons" the number of people living at Stellacoom when it was incorporated in 1858.

PORTLAND, June 6 (AP) — Nettie Brown not only lost her \$450-per-month "spiritual" pro- tege but has now bumped into a \$21,430 circuit court suit as well.

Circuit Judge Robert Tucker appointed Lamar Tooze to watch over the person and estate of Maude Cooper Meany, Portland oil land heiress, who said she paid Miss Brown to "lead her spiritually" and protect her "from bombardment."

J. M. Meany asked a guardian for his wife whose bill for Miss Brown's "spiritual guidance" came—Tooze said—to \$21,430 in four years. Upon his appointment Tooze, a Portland attorney, immediately filed suit in circuit court to recover the money.
