Fishin's Fun

HARRIMAN LODGE on Upper Klamath lake has been steadily reporting some fine fish caught. Most of the trolling is done with "Jigger Wobblers," with two-tone No. 4, the most popular lure. Trolling a little faster than ordinary sometimes brings unexpected results.

UPPER KLAMATH LAKE at the mouth of Wood river and Seven Mile creek has been fair. Mostly trolling wobblers with some egg fishing.

WOOD RIVER has fallen off but at certain times some very large fish are caught, mostly on cluster eggs. Some of the spinner fishermen have had good luck.

LAKE O' THE WOODS reports few fish taken. A few rainbow, trolling flashers.

FISH LAKE is not reported as right. Spot fishing with worms is about the only way fish have been caught.

FOUR MILE is well worth the tough trip. Fish mostly work on bait, some trolling and in the afternoon flies of a light color make a killing.

BLUE LAKE reports good fly fishing and some bait. Grey flies are best.

NORTH FORK OF SPRAGUE RIVER has shown signs of life and fish are being caught on cluster eggs and flies. The fish run to good size with plenty of life and fight.

GERBER DAM is fair on perch and crappie with bass running a slow last.

ODELL LAKE after that 34 "what-is-it" has had a lot of attention. Fishing has been good as usual on flies and trolling. Bucktail coachman is the favorite fly and plugs and flashers for trolling, with plugs taking the largest number of big fish.

CRESCENT LAKE better than it has been for some time. The fish have been running two and three pounds and are being taken on both fly and trolling. Use the "Doc Shelton" and "Trout-o-reno" on trolling and your choice on flies.

CRESCENT CREEK has been producing limit catches on flies. White bucktail and caddis are favorites.

TIMPANOGUS AND FAWN LAKES are producing limit catches on both spinner and fly. They seem to be biting anything.

ROSARY LAKES above Odell lake are the surest thing. This week a number of limits have been taken of both eastern brook and rainbow. In the MIDDLE ROSARY the fish run small, but in abundance. In NORTH and SOUTH ROSARY LAKES the fish are larger and the Rainbow taken have run about 14 inches. Fly fishing is best. Almost anything works with grey

CANTERBURY GOLF CLUB, Cleveland, June 7 (AP)—The first player to get as hot as the weather as the field started in pursuit of Sam Snead Friday in the second round of the national open golf championship was Bruce Coltart, a professional from Haddonfield, N. J., who shot a dazzling 32 on the out nine.

He needed that, and more, as he opened with an 80 Thursday. His card showed four consecutive birdies from the fourth hole through the seventh.

Lawson Little, Ed Dudley and Tony Manero each turned the first nine in par 36. Little was working on a 72, Dudley on a 73 and Manero on a 75. Dudley three-putted the ninth from eight feet.

There was scarcely a breath of wind and the scores promised to remain low at least through Friday.

CLEVELAND, June 7 (AP)—Samuel Jackson Snead, the hill-billy from West Virginia whose swing is sweeter than mountain music, strummed his sticks for a record 67 Thursday to take the first round lead in the national open golf championship.

His five-under-par score, achieved by a beautiful show of power and finesse, was the lowest opening round in the history of the tournament. From first tee to final green Snead was as accurate as a moonshiner of his native state firing at a revenue officer.

The 67 established a new competitive record for the long Canterbury course and enabled Snead to take charge despite a day of brilliant firing by his rivals, no fewer than 16 of whom bettered or equaled par.

Perfect Day
Thursday was a perfect day for low scoring and those who met with disaster had no excuse. Nature gave her best to Canterbury. There wasn't a cloud in the sky, the wind was negligible, and a hot sun beat down on the course to create ideal playing conditions.

Close on Sam's hot heels were a trio of 69 shooters—Horton Smith, Sam Parks, the 1935 champion, and Ed (Porky) Oliver, winner of two winter circuit tournaments.

Parks and Oliver played sound golf to trim three strokes off par, but Smith, as usual, was all over the course, and relied on his putting wizardry to save him. Smith had eleven one-putts and almost as many spectacular recovery shots from the rough and traps.

A stroke back of this trio was the pre-tournament favorite, little Ben Hogan, big Vic Ghezzi, and the little known Al Huske, all of whom had 70's.

Five others broke par with 71's and of the five some one Gene Sarazen, twice a winner of the nation, was a "name" golfer. The others were a pair of Gibson boys, A. Babbish and A. Kaiser.

The par 72 shooters listed such well known stars as Lawson Little, Craig Wood, the defending champion, Byron Nelson, and Leonard Dodson. The last-named blew a fine chance to share the lead with Snead when he spoiled an outgoing nine of 33 with an inglorious 39 coming home.

After the 72's came the deluge. John Montague, one-time mystery man of golf, disappointed a big gallery with an 80. Big John closed with a terrific eight on the eighteenth hole. Johnny Goodman, winner in 1933, shot a duffer's 82.

FOXX, GROVE KEEP BOSTON AT LOOP TOP

Jimmie Foxx and Lefty Grove, who have been performing feats of baseball magic these many years, still can lift a rabbit out of a hat when occasion demands.

Occasion demanded Thursday and these two long-time associates beat the St. Louis Browns 3-1 to preserve the Boston Red Sox' shaky half-game grip on the American league lead.

Grove has been tottering for weeks as a starting pitcher. He was getting knocked out in every game. And when he stiffened the slugging Browns on six hits in this one he still was on the verge of losing 1-0 because one of the hits was a home run by Chet Laabs.

Then Foxx, who had shared Grove's glory for years, came to bat in the ninth inning with two on and two out and poled out his 14th homer of the season to win the game.

The victory broke Boston's three-game losing streak.

The Cleveland Indians were poised to take over the lead if Boston had been beaten. The Tribe's terrific infield twins, Lou Boudreau and Ray Mack, took charge of beating the Washington Senators 5-4 in 11 innings. Held at bay by the fine hurling of Rookie Sid Hudson for seven innings, Cleveland tied the score in the eighth when Mack homered. Then in the 11th Boudreau singled home the run that won.

In the National league the Brooklyn Dodgers nursed a new winning streak to five games and moved within a game of the pace-setting Cincinnati Reds by caging the St. Louis Cardinals 9-5. John Mize's 15th homer of the season went to waste.

The Pittsburgh Pirates battled the Boston Bees into a tie for the cellar spot with a 7-6 triumph. The Bees bunched five runs in the second inning and the Pirates came back with a six-run cluster in the third.

The Chicago Cubs set off their biggest hitting fireworks of the season to trounce the Phillies 11-5. Among the Bruins' 17 hits were two homers by Bill Nicholson and three consecutive doubles by Phil Cavaretta.

The world champion New York Yankees and the Detroit Tigers both were out-ruled.

Pitcher Buck Ross hit a two-run homer as the Philadelphia Athletics nicked Buck Newsom for three runs in the third. Then Detroit batted Ross out of the box in the eighth only to have the A's score three more runs in the last half of the same inning and win 7-4.

Hustling Kennetts Aspire To Klamath Softball Crown

A hustling, confident group of youngsters this year representing Webb Kennett, Klamath Falls clothier, in the Klamath softball circuit, aspire to be among the teams that reach the local playoff series in August when the season comes to a close. MOTOR, SAIL RACES BRING CHAMPS HERE

Decks are fast being cleared at the Shippington boat landing and arrangements to accommodate approximately 60 boats of all classes are being rounded into shape by Vally Hector and his junior chamber committee-men for the annual regatta Sunday on Upper Klamath lake.

New entrants in the speedboat races and announcement of a special diving event featured last minute developments at the lake Friday.

Holders of world, national and Pacific coast records in various outboard events will compete on the course, capping a program that will bring together the largest assortment of craft ever seen in action here.

Harold Ashley of Marysville, Calif., holder of the world's record for straightaway and circle course and present national champ in the "C" service runabout class, will be on hand, as will Bill Tinney of Bend, who held the national "A" hydroplane championship in 1938.

Heinie Fluhrer of Medford, holder of the Pacific coast title in 1938 for class "F" runabouts, will enter the races in the spectacular class "F" class, along with Don Stansell and his decker, Joe Roads. Howdie Murray will ride with Fluhrer. This group is the largest outboard classification and speeds around 50 miles an hour are expected.

In the sailboat races several national-one design boats have been put in the water.

It was announced by the junior chamber that Prince Selaki Nehalakis, noted wrestler-diver, will perform from a high-dive platform now being rigged up at the lake. Nihalakis, who has entered Olympic competition, will take off from a platform 80 feet from the water.

Trout Census Planned in Modoc County

Past fish planting records reveal that in the four-year period, 1936-1939, 472,000 rainbow, 587,000 eastern brook, and 555,000 Loch Leven, a total of more than 1,600,000 trout have been planted in the streams and lakes of Modoc county.

In an attempt to determine what is being accomplished by this fish planting program the Modoc County Wildlife Protective association with the cooperation of the forest service and the California division of fish and game will conduct a creel census on the local streams and lakes this season. The major objective of the study will be to follow up a series of past plantings of fingerling trout to determine how many of the planted fish are reaching the angler's creels.

Hollywood shut out Portland 6 to 0 for its second win in three games with the cellar team.

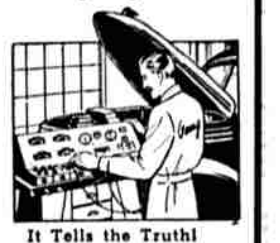
Baer Scores Fast Campoli Kayo
